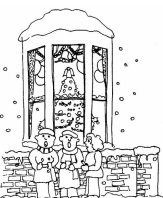

New Vicar for Pentyrch Parish

The appointment of the Revd. John Binny BA as Vicar of Pentyrch with Capel Llanilltern was announced on Sunday 27th October. The Revd. Binny is currently the Rector Vicar of Eglwysbrewis with St. Athan and Gileston in the Vale of Glamorgan, where he has been the incumbent since 1982. He is married to Judy, who is a teacher at St. Athan's Primary School. They have two children, both of whom attended the Bishop of Llandaff High School. Rachel, who is 22, works as a Trading Standards Officer in Coventry having graduated from Manchester Metropolitan University, and Christopher, who is at Warwick University studying Biological Sciences.

John Binny, whose parental home was in Rhiwbina, was educated at Penarth Grammar School. After university he studied Theology at Lampeter before being ordained in Llandaff Cathedral, as a Deacon in 1971 and as a Priest in 1972. He was an assistant Curate in Llantrisant from 1971 to 1977 when he became Vicar of Troedyrhiw, where he served until his translation to St. Athan.

He married Judy, whom he had met in Llantrisant, in 1975. Although Judy was born in Welshpool she was brought up in Yorkshire, where her father, who was in the Army was later posted. She trained to be a Home Economics teacher at Worcester Training College and later graduated in Biology through the Open University. When they moved to St. Athan she became involved with the local play group and later undertook part time Biology teaching at Balfour House School in St. Athan. Her work with the playgroup led her to a change of career and she took a sabbatical year to complete the Primary Teacher Conversion Course at the Teachers' College in Cyncoed. After she had taught for a number of years in the Infant School in St. Athan this school was amalgamated with the Junior School to form St. Athan Primary where she now takes the Year Two class and is the

Science Co-ordinator. In the village she is a member of the Women's Institute (a Former president).

Judy and Christopher are both members of Côr Bro Ogwr and the Mid-Glamorgan Savoyards.

John believes in the importance of Parish Ministry and enjoys working with people of all ages. He is "Broad" in Churchmanship and is happy to fit in with the tradition of the Parish. Visiting is important part of his mission and he places great emphasis on getting to know people in their own homes. His experience has encompassed both rural industrial and rural dormitory communities. He is Vice-Chairman of the Board of Governors of the St. Athan Primary School and a founder member of the Parent Teacher Association. He regularly takes school assembly and visits classes and welcomes the children to the parish church for special services. He ministers in a local Residential Care Home and has counselled young care assistants who are learning to cope with death.

In recent years St. Athan's Church has held well-advertised "At Home" days to welcome people from the community and beyond to learn more about the church, its life and ministry, past and present and its aims for the future. During the recent millennium and Royal Golden Jubilee celebrations the church of the parish played an integral part, with Civic Services, Flower Festivals and involvement in village events. Many villagers responded to the invitation to make kneelers for the church to mark the Millennium. Co-operation with the St. Athan Methodist Church has been a marked feature of his ministry.

There is a liaison committee of lay people and he has regular meetings with the Methodist Minister. Some services are shared and joint Lent Lunches and Bible Study Groups are held.

I am sure that all the readers of this magazine will wish to join with the Churchwardens and myself in welcoming John and Judy to the parish and wishing them a very happy and fruitful ministry within the Parish of Pentyrch with Capel Llanilltern.

CRIME PREVENTION

Since June 2002 Police Constable Lisa BISHOP has been appointed as the new community constable for Pentyrch, Creigiau, Gwaelod Y Garth and Capel Llanilltern areas of Cardiff.

During the first three months it has become apparent that a number of crimes that have occurred in the area could have easily been avoided by simple crime prevention. For example there have been 8 dwelling burglaries in the area, 5 of which entry was gained as the properties were left insecure. This figure is much higher than the Home Office statistics which states two out of ten burglaries occurred in insecure premises. Simple crime prevention measures should be adopted such as fitting and more importantly using deadlocks on all doors. A third of burglars get in through a back window. Easily visible locks may deter some thieves because a window lock forces the thief to break glass and risk attracting attention. The keys from the window locks should be removed and kept out of sight in a safe place. Good lighting can deter a thief. Some exterior lights have an infra-red sensor that switches the light on for a few moments when it detects something in its range. Visible burglar alarms are also beneficial and may make a burglar think twice.

On a similar note during the past three months there have been 7 reported thefts of motor vehicles - 2 were left insecure and one was even left with the keys in the ignition. Please securely lock all vehicles, even if you are simply popping in the local shop for a few moments.

There have been 5 thefts from vehicles - again one was left insecure and in another valuable items were left on display. It has also been noted that thieves target expensive alloy wheels from parked vehicles. It is possible to secure these with locking wheel nuts - these can deter thieves and make their task comparatively more difficult.

The overall crime figures for the area is extremely low in comparison to adjacent areas in Cardiff.

ANOTHER SPARKLING INDIAN SUMMER

Seasons seem to get progressively wierder as global warming creeps up on us. There is more of everything, first rain and wind, now continuing sunshine. It was first of July before I ventured from dark winter slacks into a light summer frock, the unfamiliar sight scaring the daylights out of my feral cats.

Until then unremitting rain had been claiming the last of their evening snacks. An army of slugs, marching on its stomach, converged on the damp remains and one night I surprised a distinctly satisfied toad-in-the-bowl among their depleted ranks.

Banks of low cloud during our soggy June forced screaming flocks of swifts and house martins down, day long, over Gwaelod village, to disappear only when the sun drew their winged prey up out of sight. Once this celestial body decided to show itself there was no stopping it.

However these figures can be reduced even further if complacency is cast aside and the simple crime prevention advice is followed.

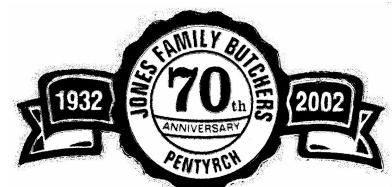
Nocturnal moths were being hunted by pipistrelle and noctule bats at the time of year when the yelping of tawny owls indicated that the owlets were being driven from the nests.

Woods remained green well into October, with only horse chestnut and sycamore showing a preponderance of yellow, while scarlet embers glowed from the depths of gold-tinged sumachs and variegated reds from the maples. Our bonus of summer sunshine in mid October highlighted the blizzard of winged birch seeds floating down from the disintegrating catkins - covering the dried cat food with confetti before the recipients had a chance to finish it. A deluge of rain on the thirteenth, unlucky Sunday when many walkers were headed for the hills, and then the blue skies were back. For how long?

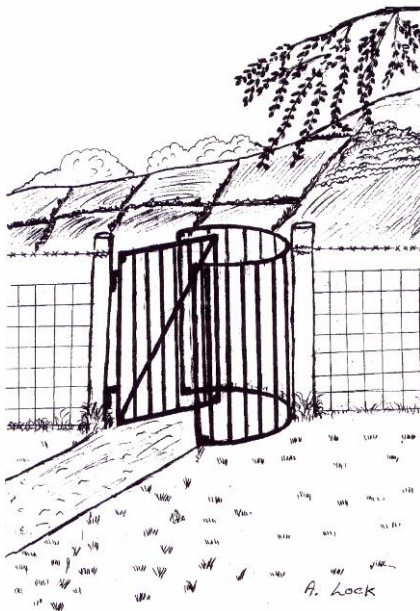

Countryside Access

Living in a semi-rural community some of us take for granted access to the countryside around us. But for some members of that community countryside access is increasingly under threat. I refer to the less able bodied who walk upon footpaths only to have their progress impeded by gates and stiles that are erected with no thought to their ease of us. Increasingly landowners are constructing stiles that are too high or require a fair amount of physical fitness in order to be negotiated. Often the plank that serves as a step is missing turning the stile into a fence, or the top bar of the stile is too high making leg clearance difficult. Of course landowners have a right to secure their stock but the old method that involved the use of "KISSING GATES" as they were known was much easier for the public to negotiate.



Alas not many of these gates now remain in our area, but some can still be found in Gwaelod y-Garth and Pentyrch. Originally they were painted green and constructed of iron. An iron gate opened within a semi-circular set of iron railings, which limited progress to one person

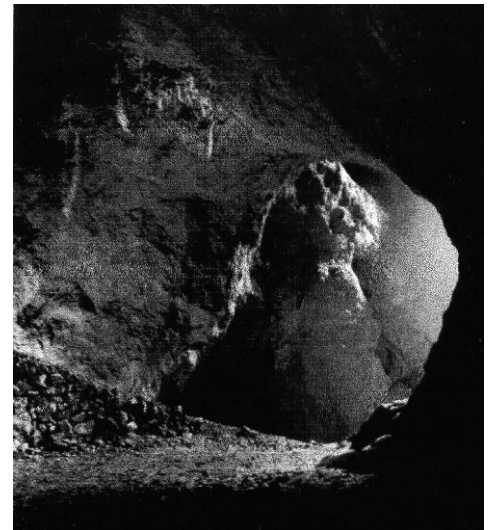
Old Iron Workings

A ten year old from Gwaelod y Garth has awakened interest in the Old Iron Workings deep inside the Little Garth. Joseph Thorne wrote to the South Wales Echo asking for current news of the ancient workings after finding old newspaper cuttings from a decade ago about the local campaign to save the works.

The old iron workings have a long history. In fact, iron cropping on the Little Garth was a vital to the iron age community 2000 years ago. In 1565, iron works were opened and worked until 1625. In the eighteenth century, the Blackmoor Booker company re-opened the old mine pit which had been abandoned when it became too deep to work safely. In 1815-30 new furnaces were built to burn coke instead of charcoal and eventually a tunnel was created in the North side of the hill to the bottom of the pit, about 400 feet down. There were other tunnels to the East and the West. Men and boys worked in the pit by candle light until it was closed at the end of the nineteenth century.



There has always been public interest in the mine workings, with reports of visitors being taken on guided tours in the 1870's. More recently, cave divers have reported on the submerged old blacksmiths shop complete with tools and the fantastic underground lakes, one of which is known as the Blue Waters, due to a spectacular effect created by sunlight shafting down into the underground lake, cutting through the darkness.

At the conclusion of the local campaign a decade ago, the site was declared to be worthy of national monument status and there was talk of Listing by the Archaeological Trust. Nothing has happened for a decade - until now. Prompted by a letter from Joseph Thorne to MP Kim Howells, CADW say that they will now reconsider the Listing of the site. In the meantime, Joseph has been shown around the quarry by quarry manager, Roger Shepherd, who is enthusiastic about the preservation of the iron working site.

at a time, but involved no climbing or undue physical effort. Some were fitted with springs that shut the gate behind you with a loud crash, preventing stock from getting out. Their advantage over stiles was that they stood the test of time, not rotting like wood, hence the old remaining examples in our area

There is hope however, at least in the Gower area where I have seen modern versions in grey steel in use.

PENTYRCH BUS 136

On behalf of the residents of Pentyrch, Pentyrch WI arranged a petition to be delivered to Cardiff County Council, The Welsh Assembly and Dr Kim Howells to impress on them the difficulties that we are experiencing with buses being late, journeys being aborted through lack of time and lastly, not turning up at all.

Stagecoach have been approached by all parties and Jane Davidson and Kim Howells have reported their findings to the Traffic Commissioner. Jane Davidson held a meeting in Pentyrch Village Hall to listen to the complaints from a cross section of the community.

Stagecoach admit that they have experienced difficulties with the service stating that they are committed to overcoming their difficulties on the 136 service and are working with Cardiff County Council Transport Department to shorten the bus route while maintaining the present timetable. They state also that they are committed to improve the standard of service and will inform us when solutions have been reached.

Changes to the 136 Bus Service

The Council allocates grant aid to applications from organisations within the Community Council area at Council meetings in March, June, September and December. All applications must be supported by recent audited accounts, as appropriate and should give an indication of the purpose for which the grant is required and an indication of the amount of the grant requested.

Creigiau Adventure Playground

Replacement parts to reinstate the Adventure Playground are expected any day. It is anticipated that the park will be back in working order ready for the school Christmas holidays.

Private Boundaries

The increased construction of boundary walls in Pentyrch has led to a number of queries regarding the legal requirements. The County's advice is that boundary walls/fences can be up to 2 metres high but only up to 1 metre high when they are adjacent to an adopted highway. Adopted pavements are classified as adopted highways. Planning permission should be sought if walls/fences exceed these limits.

Freedom of Information

The Community Council have adopted a model Publication Scheme, approved by the Information Commissioner, in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000. Anyone wishing to view the Scheme should contact the Clerk.

Bronllwyn and Penuel Graveyards

Following a safety inspection of the memorial stones at the above graveyards emergency work was carried out and a number of stones were laid flat in the interest of public safety. 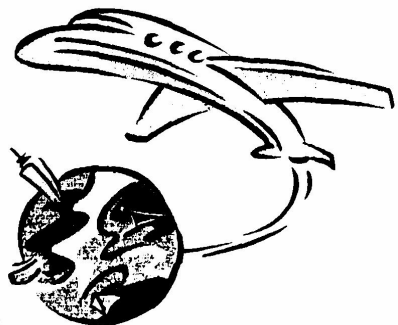

Scout Group to turn trash into cash

Pentyrch residents are being asked to save office materials that normally end up in the bin - used printer cartridges and old mobile phones - to help raise funds for the Pentyrch scout group. Cartridges are found in printers, fax machines and desktop copiers in homes and offices.

The 1st Pentyrch scouts, cubs and beavers have teamed up with leading recycling company Eurosource in an innovative fundraising scheme. The group will receive a cash donation for each item recycled.

Throwing away old mobile phones and cartridges causes pollution. Some mobile phone batteries contain cadmium and other toxic substances, which when dumped in landfill sites, leak into the soil. It takes more than 1.5 pints of oil to make a new toner cartridge and in the last decade it is estimated that millions of pounds worth of printer cartridges were dumped in landfill sites. The recycled cartridges are sold to manufacturers in the UK who refill them for resale. Mobile phones are sold for use in developing countries.

Readers are asked to donate their unwanted mobile phones, chargers, batteries and accessories, plus used printer inkjet, bubblejet, laser and toner cartridges from home, friends and their workplace if possible.

They can be left at the following local drop-off point: Follis Newagents, Pentyrch. Businesses can add support by pledging their empty cartridges to 1st Pentyrch Scouts. There is no cost involved as Eurosource provide free collection boxes which they uplift free of charge.
