The lunch club meets every Tuesday in Pentyrch Village Hall and welcomes diners from Creigiau, Gwaelod y Garth and Pentyrch. If

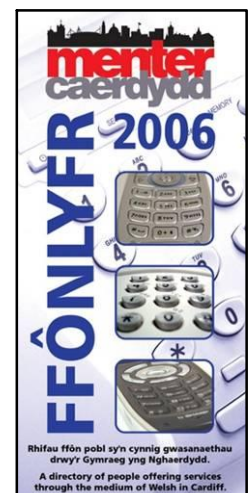



New Plans for Gwaelod y Garth Woods



After Listening to you during a process of public consultation back in March 2005 in Taff's Well, Coed y Gedrys and Coed Rhiw'r Ceiliog now have new Forest Design Plans.

We have taken on board what local people said, as we started to work through our Forest Design planning process to produce the Forestry Commission blueprint for the future of the two woods. What you want from the woods has been balanced with the needs of the woods for conservation, biodiversity, recreation and timber.

The majority of these woodlands will generally be subject to gradual thinning to restore semi-natural ancient woodland, as these woodlands are designated as 'Plantations on Ancient Woodland Sites' ('PAWS' for short). In both cases we will be leaving the broadleaves and encouraging more to grow through natural regeneration; and some planting if there are any problems with the natural regrowth of broadleaf trees. So, this will make those of you who said that you wanted more broadleaf happy as we start to increase the chances of this over time.

At Coed y Gedrys we shall be starting to take out conifers soon. In Coed Rhiw'r Ceiliog, however, due to problems with access we're not sure when work will actually start on site.

We've taken down trees that were encroaching at the backs of some houses and hedges along the entrance lane have been cut back and will be trimmed every year from now on.

In terms of other issues people were concerned about, we have made a start in addressing them. The improvements you asked for to the entrance to Coed y Gedrys have already happened, opening up the forest roads and putting in new gates for people and horses.

Water problems behind houses will be investigated further in the New Year i.e. when the land is at its wettest.

So the Forestry Commission is listening and the local area Ebbw Team will carry on trying to make the work in our woods fit in with what you and our other partners want. With local people and users of FC woodlands talking to us, we can make a real difference to both of these woodlands, not just for peoples'

enjoyment now, but for future generations as well.

Thank you to everyone who participated in this consultation process and I want to say a special 'On your Bikes!' to the local young people getting out into the woods on their mountain bikes and getting some exercise; it's great these woodlands are well used by you all. Please talk to us before you do as in January we will be looking a lot more closely at what is possible locally with the involvement of local people.... But please note if you do want to see something positive happen, you have to think about what you can help out with; so get talking to each other and your local community centre. Forestry Commission will not do everything; we need you on board to make it work. Mountain biking is a great sport and we're all for it!

Meantime, the good news for anyone looking for more extreme cycling we have a cross country trail at Cwmcarn Forest Drive near Crosskeys, with a purpose built downhill trail. Also, there's a jump spot at Caerphilly in Coed Park Van Woodland on Vann Road too. Play safe, and enjoy!

So, Forestry Commission Progress so far... Hedges along the lane to the woodlands have been cut. The entrance to Coed y Gedrys has been made easier, particularly for horses and people with prams or mobility difficulties. Conversion to broadleaf woodlands is imminent in terms of clearance of conifers.

Easter Message from Rev J W Binny Vicar of Pentyrch

Dear Friends,

In wartime all serving on Navy ships knew the signal "Action Stations". It meant and it means that positions are to be taken for engagement with the enemy, whether from sea or shore or air. Battle stations means action.

In life we can at times sense a spiritual warfare. As the New Testament makes clear, when we are faithful to the best we know, loyal to God whom we know best in Jesus Christ, we engage in a battle against sin and temptation. God Himself leads the fight. Easter is the anniversary of God's action station. It was taken at a definite point in our human history and at a known location on our planet. The event was the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Although the battle at Calvary on Good Friday seemed a defeat for Jesus Christ and resulted in His death the cross, it was not a disaster but a victory. Soon after the crucifixion the followers of Jesus were proclaiming confidently that Jesus was alive, that somehow He had won a victory over sin and death, over the worst life could throw at Him, for all people.

Study the evidence in the Bible and almost twenty centuries of Church history. (a) The Church survived the death of her Founder and Head because He is alive again and fills us with His life, His strength and His power. (b) Jesus showed Himself alive to His apostles and loyal but sceptical friends after His death. (c) The tomb in which His lifeless body had lain was found empty on the third day after burial, and no enemies produced the body to refute the astounding claims of the early Christians that somehow He had been raised to life after His body died – a claim which was a central part of the Faith for which many of them died and, whilst a person may die to defend the truth, one does not usually die for what one knows is a falsehood. A group of disciples, dispirited at the death of Jesus, now boldly proclaimed their risen Lord.

The resurrection of Jesus was a mighty act of God. Calvary and the tomb of Joseph were God's action station. He acted. Again and again in the New Testament the resurrection is described as the result of God's raising

Therefore, we have this confidence that when we are down and out, at the end of our tether "the God who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will also give new life to our mortal bodies through His indwelling Spirit." (Romans Chapter 8). We find ourselves in despair, we confess our failure. Then God acts and fills our lives with the life of the risen Jesus. The Christian hope of resurrection for all who put their trust in God through Jesus Christ is that our life shall be lived in fellowship with God through Jesus Christ. It is life beyond our highest imaginings because it is life mediated through Jesus Christ to all who call upon them. Let us all face the future with confidence in the light of Christ's resurrection. We are heirs of the resurrection. The Risen Jesus is with us!

Wakey, Wakey Rise and Shine!

Most of us have an alarm clock - something that makes a noise and wakes us up - bedside clock, small child . . . But on 2nd January this year I had a wake up call of a different nature. The previous evening I had gone to bed feeling a bit low - I've always disliked New Year *and I am a Scot!*

However on that Monday morning I woke up with a start to see a sentence running in front of my eyes - a bit like the ones in cinemas telling you to switch off your mobile. But the words I could see were commanding me to do something very specific. There was no polite request. Reminder to Dog Owners

It has come to that time of year in the countryside again when the fields are filling up with young lambs, a time when a flock of sheep is at its most vulnerable. It is the duty of every dog owner to ensure that their dog is not a danger to farm animals, especially sheep at all times. Most dog owners show great responsibility and keep their dogs on a lead or under very close control, but sadly there are some not so responsible, and they can wreak havoc in the countryside.

By Law, one must control dogs so that livestock, birds and wildlife are not disturbed. Dogs, by law, **must** be kept on a short lead - not even an extendable one - in all areas of open countryside and Common Land between 1st March and the 31st July, and at all times of the year where farm animals are grazing.

By Law farmers are entitled to destroy a dog that injures or worries their animals but most farmers detest having to do so, and it is an action that we should not have to take if only the dog owner showed respect and responsibility.

May I also remind people that when their dog fouls, it must be cleared up wherever they are, this rule does not just apply to the High Street, but in open countryside, Common Land - and that includes the Garth Mountain - and footpaths. It is also important to ensure that your dog is wormed regularly.

Community Council Highlights

Busy New Clerk

This is my first contribution to the Community Link and my first opportunity to cast my mind back over the last 4, somewhat frenetic, months. I was told when I started this role that it would be a huge learning curve. A curve would have been nice but I have had a vertical ascent without the aid of an elevator.

The variety of roles demanded of the Clerk is the first thing that strikes you. No two days are the same and it is a genuine pleasure when you can achieve a positive outcome for a resident. It is also frustrating when the bureaucratic wall is as impenetrable to me as it can be to you.

Like most people I have always wondered what the Community Council in my area does. I am staggered that Pentyrch Community Council is so high profile in the lives of people in this area. Everybody knows that there is a Community Council for the simple reason that this publication drops through every letterbox three times a year. Added to that the fact that the PCC have an identifiable centre of operations and a vehicle with its own logo travelling around the villages everyday and you would have to be a hermit not to realise that there is an active and ever present entity working for the community. I only wish I could say the same for my own area despite paying the same amount towards my Community Council that resident's pay here.

Litter

I know that litter is a huge problem in all areas of Wales, not just Cardiff. However this area seems to have more than its fair share of dumped rubbish. It never ceases to amaze me that people will drive out of their way to dump a settee on a lay by in a country lane when they could just as easily take it to the Council site at Waungron Road. Thankfully there are individuals who take litter very seriously and not only litter pick themselves, as I do on the country lane outside my own house, but also advise us of litter hotspots in the area. In addition the Community Maintenance

officers litter pick everyday and the accumulated rubbish means that we are making more and more frequent trips to Lamby Way. This costs not only in time and fuel but also the cost of paying the Lamby Way site.

At the end of the day we are all responsible for litter and cannot ignore it just because there are active litter pickers employed by the Community Council. We all have a responsibility if we see litter or somebody dropping litter. Taking action against the litterers is sometimes the only way of making them realise that what they are doing is wrong. It is also a matter of taking a pride in the environment we live. Don't ignore it, either pick it up or report it to the appropriate authority and when Cardiff County Council are inundated with reports of litter from Pentyrch, Creigiau and Gwaelod y Garth, perhaps they will stop regarding this area as the North West Frontier and start instigating regular litter picking and rubbish collection services.

Fly Tipping

This also brings me onto the subject of Fly tipping as we come to that time of the year when it becomes more prevalent as people employ 'cowboys' to trim hedges and cut back trees. Make sure that who you employ recycles the green waste properly and doesn't just chuck it over the wall to cause somebody else a problem.

Precept

A precept of £63,000 has been set for the year 2006/2007 and the cost for a Band D property will be £20.30. This represents a **reduction** on the current cost for a Band D property of 3.29%.

Police

My predecessor, Yvonne Krip, announced in the last Link that PC Lisa Bishop had transferred to another department. Sadly despite all our best efforts a replacement seems as far away as ever. However Jacquetta Jones, one of the Police Community Support Officers working from Fairwater, has been asked to concentrate her efforts on the Pentyrch area, she has already been seen

walking around the area. We welcome her and look forward to seeing more of her around the villages.

Woodlands under threat

Living in Gwaelod-y-Garth we are blessed with an abundance of trees for everyone to enjoy. However lately these trees are coming under increasing threat, and in my lifetime I have seen a substantial amount of them lost to the chainsaw. Vandalism and the pressure of housing development are two contributing factors in their decline.

There is a small area in the village, however, that is owned by the council and the trees are subject to protection, to be enjoyed by all. The area in question has been named "The Gwaelod-y-Garth Woodland", and can be found behind the main road at Garth Villas by the School. Footpaths run through the area and the council have provided a wooden bench for summer picnics. Bird life thrives here, and plant life, with the spring and early summer being the best times to visit. Of particular beauty are the carpets of bluebells to be found in sections of the wood which rival other local areas in their impressiveness.

Alas this area too is under threat, not by development, but by the actions of a minority of vandals. Fire lighting at the base of trees, dumping of litter, the remains of all night parties, and destruction of the paths by motorbikes and mountain bikes, all undermine the beauty of this area. We all need to show respect for the environment so future generations can enjoy it. As for the mountain bikes, talks with the forestry may lead to a course being developed in the future, but at present they are welcome to use the two forestry plantations in the village. They must do this safely and with due consideration for other users and keep off the footpaths and not build jumps, which could cause accidents.

So why not visit the woodlands for a walk, and report any problems to the community council, so the area can be kept in good repair for all to enjoy.

Residents who have lived in the village for some time will be aware of the Cherry trees planted at the entrance to the village. In spring the blossom produced is quite magical as it drifts down like snow welcoming you to Gwaelod-y-Garth. Alas age, disease, and vandalism have left these trees reduced in numbers. It occurred to me to have them replanted, and with support of the Community Council, and the planting carried out by Cardiff C.C., the trees are now replanted for future generations to enjoy the spring blossom.
