This year we are celebrating 100 years of education at the current Pentyrch primary school site! On Tuesday 3 July the children and staff enjoyed the Edwardian School Day. We all dressed up in the clothes of the time and the children experienced something of what life was like in this school in 1907. They undertook formal lessons in handwriting, arithmetic and playground drill. In our assembly they heard 'The Parable of the Sower'. Ross Lang misbehaved and received 'two strokes of the cane'! At playtime the children played with hoops, tried skipping and played marbles. In the afternoon we had a party!

On Friday 6 July we held our Centenary Exhibition in the School Hall. The children's work and research was on display. We also had historical artefacts relating to the last 100 years, kindly loaned by parents and friends of the school.

Hilltop Completes 5 Years



Hilltop Theatre Company are celebrating the completion of 5 annual seasons at Pentyrch. The group was founded in the summer of 2002, and opened in September the same year. Following consultations with local historians Hilltop are claiming to be the longest surviving amateur theatrical group in the history of Pentyrch. In fact this could be somewhat misleading, as Hilltop is not just surviving but positively thriving. The group puts on three major productions per year, and in most years manage 2 extra performance evenings – a very busy schedule.

Founding chairman Bob Petersen commented "Our total audience numbers for the three major productions have increased steadily each year, from 797 in the inaugural 2002/3 year, to 1,102 attending in 2006/7, and there is no reason that the record cannot be beaten again this year", This optimism is reiterated by current chairman (at time of writing) Martyn Lench who explained, "We have always presented a very wide range of type of production, a policy we intend to continue."

Martyn makes his directing debut with the best selling author Terry Pratchett's "Wyrd Sisters" which could be described as taking Shakespeare's "Macbeth" and turning it up 'till the knob comes off'. This comedy will be presented on 6th - 8th December 2007 and tickets can be ordered on 02920 891528. This will be followed in April 2008 with Bob directing the hugely popular Lionel Bart musical "Oliver", based on Dickens's "Oliver Twist". Another new director Helen Page will present the summer production "Steel Magnolias" in July 2008 a heart rending drama set in Louisiana, U.S.A.

Anyone interested in being involved with Hilltop only has to turn up at the Village Hall on a Thursday or Sunday from 7.30 p.m., and they may find a very demanding but rewarding hobby, make new friends, have a great time and be part of an activity which enriches community life.

MYRRH RESEARCH

Catrin Heledd Middleton from Creigiau, who is currently studying Genetics at Edinburgh University, has been undertaking research over the summer in Professor Delme Bowen's laboratory at the School of Biosciences, Cardiff University. She has been investigating the effects of chemicals isolated from the Myrrh plant on the growth and death of human breast cancer cells. Her work has shown that at particular doses chemicals from Myrrh induce a special kind of cell suicide in cancer.

Catrin also worked with Dr Jon Court previously based at Velindre Hospital but now working as a research associate in Delme's laboratory. They plan to publish and display their results at the University and hopefully extend the work next year, if funds become available from Brussels.

Have you seen the fantastic new floor?

During the summer break the Hall has been a whirlwind of activity with the stage curtains down for cleaning; new skirting, the front of the stage changed; repair made to the Committee Room roof and the floor.

After a great deal of research it was agreed to use heavy duty vinyl flooring in the form of wood-like panels. The badminton court was outlined in a different colour (saving £150 annually on repainting) and the back lobby was floored in a sheet vinyl, with a carpet at the entrance

A total amount of £20,000 was spent, the vast majority coming from Landfill Trust (gained with the help of Ymlaen Pentyrch) and an insurance claim dating from 2006. As I write, a donation has been received from Pentyrch Open Gardens to pay for the cleaning of the curtains and the decorating of the lobby and toilet area

The committee is very grateful to all the organisations and individuals who help the hall maintain the standard set 30 years ago. A special thank you to Richard Porch who was our Project Manager and who gave so much time and expertise to the Hall.

Fundraising continues with a quiz on November 2nd, Carols and Christmas Market on November 30th and a Children's Party on December 16th.

Pentyrch Sports Association

The Pentrych Sports Association (PSA) was set up some years ago following the securement of the Parc Y Dwrlyn playing fields on a very long term lease from Taff Ely Borough Council. The PSA is the umbrella organisation for all of the sports clubs that use Parc Y Dwrlyn – Bowls, Cricket, Football, Rugby and Tennis.

All 5 clubs are thriving concerns with one big aim – to provide a safe and enjoyable environment for local persons of all ages to participate and socialise in a sporting atmosphere. It is very common for people to be members of more than one of the clubs!

The PSA committee is comprised of at least one representative from each club, the Pentyrch Community Council, a treasurer and secretary, and is chaired at present by John Moore (Cricket). The committee oversee all general matters from boundaries, car parking, playing surfaces and the general well-being of the Parc and users.

Pentyrch Cricket Club have 2 teams competing in the highest divisions of Welsh League Cricket, and their junior section has a membership that grows annually. The summer of 2007 saw 5 players being selected for Wales at their age group and 10 representing the County.

Pentyrch Rugby Club run 3 adult teams, including the much-feared Veterans XV, plus age group teams from Youth down to Under 8s. The club has for the last few of years had the largest Mini and Junior rugby section in the country. At the end of September, 20 boys aged 11 and 12 competed in a "World Cup" international tournament in Rodez in South West France - the second year running they have proudly represented Wales with much distinction against teams from all the top European rugby nations plus South Africa, New Zealand and Australia. This season the Pentyrch RFC is celebrating its 125th anniversary with many functions planned.

Pentyrch Tennis Club is thriving – so much so that it has only recently purchased a splendid new "Alpine Chalet" style club house, and had the playing surface of the 3 tennis courts 4 refurbished. Their facilities are the envy

of many local clubs. They have a busy junior section with coach Graham North helping to produce a number of excellent players of the future.

Pentyrch Rangers Football Club were formed in 1990 and have continued to grow ever since. They now run teams from under 8s to under 16s (more than 1 team in some age groups) – their 200 plus members competing weekly in the Cardiff & District League throughout the winter.

Pentyrch Bowling Club has developed from an idea by a rugby club member into one of the few expanding bowls clubs in the country. While other clubs are declining in numbers and some even disbanding, the club continues to attract new members - both novice and experienced. Their membership which now numbers over 75, created and built their bowling green. It has been turned from a patch of waste ground into a bowling green to rival any in South Wales.

Community Sweeper for Creigiau

Sharp-eyed residents of Creigiau may have spotted the new Community Sweeper, Tom Watkins, who is based at the Creigiau Pavilion. His arrival follows the successful introduction of a Community Sweeper, Kath Britten, at Pentyrch. It should be mentioned that Kath Britten was present when a resident of Pentyrch collapsed with a heart attack at the beginning of the summer this year. Thanks to her training in first aid she went to his assistance and performed CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) until an ambulance arrived. Kath claims that she only did what anyone else would have done but nevertheless we have put her forward for an award from the Royal Humane Society.

David Jenkins Heritage Initiative

It was decided this year to slightly alter the David Jenkins Initiative so that the whole community could benefit from the competition. Consequently we cast around for a suitable project and decided that, as the information board at the Frog Pond, Creigiau, had become sun-bleached. we would replacement information board as the project for the David Jenkins Initiative.

The competition was won by Class 4 at Creigiau Primary School with a magnificent collage in a riot of colour, representing the animals that should be in the Frog Pond. The judges were so impressed with the quality of their entry that it was decided to be good enough for permanent display.

The Class's teacher. Rachel Hussey. told me that, even before the details of the competition were announced, her class of 7 - 8 year olds had talked about the problems of the Frog Pond and were unhappy that they could no longer read the display board. It was their idea to re-design the information board and advise people not to add non-indigenous animals, goldfish. In order to preserve Class 4's efforts the original was photocopied and the copy laminated. It is this copy that is currently on display. The original was laminated and presented to the school. Well done to them and Mrs

Grants

Grants are considered and awarded on a quarterly basis to all applicants from within the Community and at the end of the year we also consider those applicants outside from Community. The ones from outside the Community tend to be the large national charities and at the end of the last financial year we gave grants to, among others, Childline Cymru, Shelter Cymru, British Heart Foundation, British Red Cross, Cymdeithas Alzheimer's and MacMillan Cancer Support. There have been two meetings this year where grants have been considered and the following amounts have been awarded.

£250 to the local appeal committee of the Cardiff National Eisteddfod 2008. £250 to 1st Creigiau Scouts. £100 to the Pentyrch Village Hall £250 to the Bright Beginnings Playgroup at Creigiau £60 to the Radyr & District Good Neighbours Scheme.

Frog Pond, Creigiau

I don't know what it is about the Frog Pond but there always seem to be problems associated with it. This time last year we had the sighting of a terrapin, which has subsequently evaded all attempts to capture it and has now grown to the size of a rugby ball. To add to the problem it would seem that we now have goldfish in the pond. Some kindly soul, who could not face the prospect of killing their children's goldfish, has obviously just tipped them into the pond. Now I am told by the Community Park Rangers that goldfish are singularly the worst non-indigenous fish that could be put into a wildlife pond as they will eat everything. Needless to say our attempts, and the attempts of both the Cardiff Conservation Volunteers and the Community Park Rangers, have failed to catch any of the foreign invaders.

Land Rover

At last, after years of frugal saving, the Council has raised sufficient money to buy a new (second-hand) Land Rover. T36 BSO, in the livery of the Pentyrch Community Council, can now be glimpsed on the highways and by-ways of the Council area. The reasons for replacement were obvious to anybody who saw the old Land Rover drive past as the Q-plate Land Rover was a Heinz 57 vehicle of parts from various other It nevertheless served this Council for 8 years and has been pensioned off. The new Land Rover ticks all the boxes in terms of Health and Safety concerns and is in excellent condition and will, hopefully, serve this Community for at least a decade, if not longer.

New Administrative Assistant (Job Share)

As many of you know Caroline Morgan has been working as the Administrative Assistant for the Community Council for over a decade and recently asked to reduce her hours. It was decided to advertise for another person to job share with Caroline and in September. following an interview Mrs Madeleine Webb was appointed. Some of you will recall that Madeleine's son, Nick, was, until early 2006, a Community Councillor but who resigned his post when he moved to Bristol. Madeleine is an experienced administrator having previously worked for, among others, the Welsh Office and the Welsh Assembly. She is a welcome addition to our little team!

Missing Gwaelod-y Garth bus seat.

In the last edition of the Community Link mention was made of the disappearance of the bench at Nant y Garth. Much has been going on in an attempt by the Community Council and local residents to re-instate the bench and the latest information is that the matter is still being considered by Mr Ham of Cardiff CC Legal Services, who is waiting on a reply from Rhondda Cynon Taff, who hold the records kept by, the now defunct, Taff Ely Council. Having established at the outset that Pentyrch Community Council did not own the bench or the land upon which the bench sat, the Community Council have consistently supported the actions of the residents to get the seat reinstated and abhor what we see as an illegal annexation of land in public use. We are also extremely disappointed in the procrastination by Cardiff CC who appear to have abrogated their responsibilities in relation to this issue. Rest assured the fight will continue!

GWAELOD-Y-GARTH FOOTBRIDGE CLOSURE

Gwaelod-y-Garth residents will hopefully be aware of the closure of the footbridge that links the lower end of the village with the facilities and transport links available in Taffs Well. The closure had been planned many times in the past but failed to materialize. The maintenance works will make life difficult for regular bridge users, especially the elderly and the disabled who have no access to transport to make the long and perilous alternative route to Taff's Well. With this in mind Rhondda Cynon Taff Council has arranged a shuttle bus to travel between the two villages. The bus will run between 7.00am. and 7.00pm Monday to Saturday and 10.am to 6.00pm on Sundays. There will be no timetable and the bus will run between both ends of the bridge even if no passengers are present in order to prevent passengers waiting unseen at either end for long periods. In response to residents concerns I requested R.C.T. to ensure the bus was wheelchair and pushchair friendly and they have acted upon this. Also requested were extra operating hours to help shift workers and people travelling outside the shuttle bus hours. These have so far not been provided. I understand that R.C.T. requested Cardiff County Council to make up the 3.5 hours per day either side, between 6.30am and 10.00pm but they have not responded.

The estimated re-opening of the bridge is March 2008, but if this is not possible, then R.C.T. have promised to keep the shuttle bus in place. I put the suggestion of a temporary bridge, which was suggested by Gwaelod residents, to R.C.T. Their decision against this involves excessive costs, which they believe would have led to the deferment of the scheme and the closure of the bridge. Let us hope that despite the inconvenience we get a safe restored bridge that will last for many years to come.

The Englishman that went up a hill and came down a Mountain

Pentyrch Community Council owns 255 acres of Garth Mountain which includes the summit and essentially all the common land, around and down to the road that runs between Mountain Road, Pentyrch and Gwaelod y Garth.

There are many footpaths crisscrossing the mountain, although only 4 that are official footpaths, as marked on the definitive map, and therefore maintained and repaired by the local authority. The only one that goes over the top is Footpath 26 and this runs off Garth Hill (the road) just past the cattle grid and up towards Penmynydd Cottage. Further along Garth Hill (the road) is another footpath which runs up part way and then rejoins the road further down towards Gwaelod y Garth. This footpath is number 15. At the point where it dog-legs back down the mountain is a footpath that goes directly up the mountain to the summit. This is not an official footpath but is maintained as one by this Council. It is subject to erosion in the winter and we have had to put notices up this year warning walkers of the possible dangers. We have spent a lot of money recently shoring up the footpath to try and improve it for walkers.

Now believe it or not, it was only this footpath that was featured in the film 'The Englishman who went up a hill and came down a mountain'.

Pentyrch Community Council would like Cardiff County Council to adopt this footpath as a marked footpath and include it on the definitive map. To achieve this evidence must be adduced that this footpath has been used by residents and walkers for in excess of 20 years and we need everybody who can attest to this being the case to write to or email the Council Offices with their reminiscences and recollections. My postal address and email addresses are shown on the back page of this Community Link. Once I have collated these responses, I will write to Cardiff CC demanding that they formally adopt this footpath as the fifth official footpath on the Garth Mountain.

I would like to take this opportunity to say 'Merry Christmas' to all readers, as well as my daughter Rachel and my grandson Mojo, who are resident in Creigiau.

The Council has received emails from Bob Minton, who some of you may recall as the Community policeman in this area back in the days when we had 'Community' policemen and not a 'Neighbourhood Team'! Bob is now in the Community Safety Department and he regularly sends out information on a raft of issues. One reccurring theme is the amount of cold callers we all seem to get, especially about 'home security'. Trading Standards offers the following advice which we would be wise to heed.

- Do not accept unsolicited phone
- If you need advice about home security contact your local police
- If you need fire safety advice contact your local fire service
- A password scheme may offer additional security when dealing with callers at your home but make sure you set the password.
- Ask friends or family personal recommendations before buying something.

Fairly obvious really but somehow we forget these basics when we get flustered dealing with cold callers who are trained to be persuasive and persistent. I have my own system which is to interrupt the caller as they start their spiel by asking them where they got my telephone number and name from. usually confounds them and they something about specially selected but when I persist, they then ask me why I keep asking them. That is the point that I tell them that I am ex-directory, so how did they get my name and number? I then tell them that unless they provide me with a satisfactory explanation then I am going to hang up. They never can!

Incidentally it matters not whether you are ex-directory or not, as the not will know. frightening thing about this is that your details are sold to telephonesales companies by BT, the Local Council, the DVLA, in fact anybody who holds a mass of data is usually prepared to share it - at a price.

Radyr Comprehensive School Best Ever Results

Congratulations to those students who took their examinations in the summer. They managed to do even better than the 2006 record breakers!

We were delighted with the overall grades. We were thrilled for a whole batch of students who achieved stunningly high grades. Even better was to see so many students do so much better than we had any right to expect of them based on their prior attainment. To use the educational jargon, the 'value-added' was very high indeed.

99% of entries at A Level resulted in A-E pass grades. A record 68% resulted in the very top A and B grades.

Again at GCSE, 99% of entries resulted in A*-G pass grades and a huge 81% resulted in the higher A*-C grades.

These high levels of achievement have resulted in record numbers of GCSE students entering the sixth form to study A Levels and record numbers of A Level students getting the university places of their choice.
