Wales International **Business Park Public Inquiry**

Following pressure by Pentyrch Community Council, residents and other councils in the area, the Welsh Asembly Government has decided to call a Public Inquiry into the planning application for the Business Park development north of M4 Junction 33 at Capel Llanilltern. Anyone who wishes to appear and give evidence at the inquiry or wishes to make written comments must send their comments to the Planning Inspector by 8 January 2010 quoting reference APP/Z6815/ V/09/2112987.

The planning application was considered on 15th July 2009 by the Planning Committee of Cardiff County Council but despite opposition to the scheme from Community Councils, and neighouring County Councils as well as other individuals and groups, outline planning permission was granted. In August the Welsh Assembly Government decided to call the application in for the final decision to be made by the Welsh Ministers.

The proposed business park will cover an area of 100 acres between the M4 and Creigiau with a transport hub, offices and a five star hotel. (A map of the site was published in the Spring 2007 Community Link and can be seen on the Council website.) (Continued on Page 2)

At a Public Meeting organised by Pentyrch Community Council on 23 June which was attended by the developers during which they admitted that they had not assessed the impact of the development on M4 Junctions 32 and 34. There was outright opposition to the proposals with speakers concerned particularly about the effects on the local environment and traffic issues on the M4 and the surrounding road network.

In the meantime Pentyrch Community Council has set up an on-line e-petition on the Welsh Assembly website urging the Welsh Government to reject the plans for the Wales International Business Park. The group, called Cantorion Creigiau, have been singing for Charities for nearly 39 years, some have been members since its humble beginnings. Mair Roberts has been the Musical Director since its inception and a number of the founder members are still singing

It started as a small group of carol singers who went around Creigiau collecting money for presents for children in a local foster home, in connection with Creigiau 23. Having enjoyed the experience they wanted to continue singing and Cantorion Creigiau was born. The home has since closed but it is now a flourishing Care Home for adults with learning difficulties.

Newcomers to the Creigiau and surrounding villages might not know of our existence, and even older residents may not know of the choir's achievements.

The inaugural concert at St. Davids' Hall was given by Cantorion Creigiau with the Central Band of the R.A.F. We've appeared there several times since. There have been many television recordings. We have in the past won at the National Eisteddfod of Wales twice and won major awards at Celtic Festivals in Brittany.

Tours have taken place in France, Italy, Dublin, Vienna, Belfast and Hong Kong. Concert venues have been varied.

Remembering how it started, the choir used to go around Creigiau on the back of a lorry, always the last Sunday before Christmas, singing carols and collecting for a child related charity. As the village grew in size it was decided instead to hold an annual Carol Concert in the Church Hall.

The members give all these concerts freely, just a nominal fee is charged to cover pianist's costs. Directly and indirectly we have raised in the region of £750,000 for many charities. As an example the concert held in Acapela in December raised over £1,500.

We have made recordings and currently have 2 CDs available "Un Llais/One Voice" and Unwaith Eto/ Once Again"

We have concerts booked for the winter season and in 2010 a possible tour in Menorca.



Working for Creigiau, Pentyrch and Gwaelod y Garth

County Councillors Delme Bowen and Craig Williams cast aside party politics and joined forces in protest of the current planning system and developments in our area.

Cllrs Bowen and Williams led an amended motion at Cardiff Council meeting, which received cross party support stating: "This council believes that the whole procedure concerning the planning system lacks public confidence. It deplores the situation whereby its priorities and the priorities of local communities can be over ruled by Welsh Assembly inspectors, undermining public confidence in locally elected representatives and local democracy."

Over the summer many people have been alarmed to hear of proposed planning changes in our local communities. Cllrs Bowen and Williams opposed the International Business Park, which has now been called into the Welsh Assembly Government for final decision after local pressure.

Councillors are currently fighting to prevent proposals for a 4000 housing development on the "Waterhall" site – between St Fagans and Radyr, which would put intolerable pressure on our local infrastructure.

These are extremely important issues for our area and its long term future. It is time to put local communities back in the driving seat when development plans are considered.

Cardiff's Local Development Plan, which it is hoped will be adopted substantially unamended soon, has the full backing of Cllr Bowen and Cllr Williams. It will protect our green spaces and prevent any further expansion outside the city and our village's envelopes. Indeed much of our area will be classified as an area of "Special Landscape area".



The cost of Democracy

As readers are aware the Pentyrch Community Council operates on a very tight budget and this is spent on the maintenance of the assets which are owned by the Community Council on behalf of the residents. Community Council employs Maintenance officers to cut the grass, cut back the hedges, pick up litter, mend fences, re-furbish benches, etc., etc., at the various locations in the area that are owned by the Council. Any spare money is ear-marked for specific projects that Councillors feel may make a difference to the lives of the residents and more about these later. The Council also has to make reserves towards future events.

The bill for elections or by-elections is not picked up by the Local Authority or the Welsh Assembly Government but reserved over many years by the prudence of the Clerk and Councillors.

In August 2009 a by-election was held in Creigiau following a vacancy in the Creigiau Ward. The turn out for the election was a woeful 22% of the electorate or, put another way, only some 470 out of 2,121 on the electoral roll, ventured forth on that sultry summer's day to cast their vote. The bad news was that Cardiff CC charged this Community Council over £3,500 (nearly 5% of our total income for the year) for the privilege of having a byelection. This was despite the PCC taking a decision not to have election poll cards printed by Cardiff CC, at a further cost of £1,600, but had our own printed and distributed at a total cost of £130. It would seem that such is the cost of democracy!

It is not all bad news however as the good news is that the Community Council now has a new and most welcome Community Councillor, whose name is Wynford Ellis Owen. His contact details are shown on the last page of this Link. In addition the Community Council is pressing ahead to try and force the Welsh Assembly Government to pick up the bill for elections and by-elections at this, the primary level of local Government.

Community Council Highlights

Grants

The following grants were awarded at the June and September meetings of the Council:

- 1. £50 to Radyr & District Good Neighbour Scheme.
- 2. £50 towards an advert in the Pentyrch Open Gardens Programme
- 3. £50 for a raffle prize for the Pentyrch Open Gardens Weekend
- 4. £450 towards the cost of kit for Gwaelod Rangers FC
- 5. £210 towards the cost of Public Liability Insurance for the Fireworks display at Gwaelod y Garth Playing Fields.

The annual grants budget for the 2009/2010 year is £1,400 and after six months £810 has been spent on organisations within the Community. The next grant applications will be considered at the December 2009 meeting. Applications should be made to me, preferably by email, (clerk@pentyrch.cc) and should be accompanied by the last set of accounts or financial statement.

Council Projects

I mentioned at the beginning article that any money left over would be considered as being used for the projects that were put forward and agreed at a recent Council meeting. So, as they say on 'X-Factor', in no particular order:

- 1. Listening Link
- 2. Circular walks
- 3. Permanent Christmas Tree in Pentyrch, Christmas decorations and lights
- 4. Placing of more public seating.
- 5. Improve playground equipment and facilities.
- 6. Improvements to attractiveness of Village Entrances by use of Planters and Signs.
- 7. Hanging Baskets
- 8. To establish allotments at Fairmeadow, Pentyrch.
- 9. Litter Bin review
- 10. Review and improvement to footpath signage.
- 11. Walkways within Gwaelod y Garth area

- 12. Improve access and parking to GYG School and Village Hall.
- 13. To lobby for a cycle link from the PCC Area into Cardiff.
- 14. Publication of a directory & map of usable footpaths/bridleways in PCC area.
- 15. Liaison with Police to provide a home security pack for distribution to all households.
- 16. Planting Trees on Ffordd Dinefwr, Creigiau.

Some of these projects will cost little to no money whilst others will necessitate major investment by the Council but, to parody the old joke about what you call 6 lawyers at the bottom of the ocean, it's a start!

Cardiff Buses

Some of you will have received the 'Capital Times', the 'Pravdaesque' publication of the City and County of Cardiff and some of you may even have read it. But how many of you noticed the large map of Cardiff in the middle pages of the rag which shows the routes taken by each Cardiff bus and the number of that bus. Now look closely at the map and try and find which bus goes through Gwaelod y Garth, Pentyrch, Capel Llanilltern or Creigiau. These four villages have been part of Cardiff since 1996 and yet do not even feature on a map of Cardiff and, incidentally, nor does St Fagans. Mind you, if you look at Cardiff Bay the barrage doesn't feature either. Cardiff Bus is really on the ball isn't it????

Commiserations

Shortly before the closing date for this Link we learned that Lucie Jones had been voted out of X-factor. I am sure I was not alone in feeling that Lucie had been dealt with rather shabbily by an increasingly smug and arrogant Simon Cowell who. after weeks of complaining that the duo of John and Edward were unable to sing or dance, then voted for them and against Lucie who had been one of the best and most consistent performers competition. I am in no doubt that Lucie has a big future as singer and I hope that she will bounce back from this disappointment. The one thing she has done is in a few short weeks is to put Pentyrch firmly on the map, something which the Community Council has been trying to do for 115 years!!!

He demanded payment immediately of £31.00, or it would be £118.00 to be re-connected later. He would only accept payment by credit or debit card. Luckily, no money was handed over on this occasion. What the scammer does to demonstrate that they can cut people off is to pretend to disconnect the call and pressing the 'mute' feature on their phone. When the recipient tries to make a call he cannot get a dialling tone and believes that the phone has been cut off. After a while the caller disconnects the phone and then rings again. This appears to be a national scam which has already received some coverage recently - but it is worth reminding people NEVER to give out card details to a "cold callers". Child Mortality in **Developing Countries**

On Tuesday 30th June, a group of sixth formers from Radyr Comprehensive School attended the fifth annual Global Student Forum in Westminster, London, in order to help raise awareness of child mortality in developing countries. The forum exists to encourage school students to think carefully about the spiritual, moral, social and cultural issues underlying Global citizenship and to help others to do the same. This year, the theme of the forum was child mortality, focusing in particular on the fact that 9.2 million children die before they reach their fifth birthday, which averages about one child every three seconds.

The conference was made up of multi-media presentations, debates, workshops and live music from artists, designed to help equip us to become peer educators on our return to school and therefore contribute to the aim of raising awareness locally. The conference was a major eye-opener for all of us and made every one of us realise how fortunate we are. During the Conference we learnt there that are were five main causes of child mortality in third world countries. These were malnutrition, poor sanitation, climate change, lack of education and lack of resources. It was particularly shocking to hear that preventable diseases, the top two being pneumonia and diarrhoea, caused the most deaths amongst children in developing countries.

Catrin Cooper, one of the sixth formers that attended the conference said, 'The whole experience really changed my perspective on world issues. The facts that I learnt and images I saw really affected me and I've realised that even I can make a

difference! One of the most moving parts of the conference was Perry Nieri talking about losing her two children to aids. Hearing this firsthand account is something I will never forget.'

In the afternoon, we had the opportunity to meet with our local MP, Kevin Brennan, in the Houses of Parliament, to present him with a question to raise in parliament on our behalf. The question we chose to pose to him was "If child mortality is such a significant issue, why is it not included in our school curriculum at a younger age?" We will be meeting with him again at the start of September to further discuss with him what we will be doing and what he can do to further this cause.

It was reassuring that there were things we could do as individuals to help. We have taken the Copenhagen pledge on the Christian Aid website to

reduce our carbon footprint. Likewise, we have sent a petition to Gordon Brown urging him to attend the UN Climate Conference in Copenhagen on the 6th-8th of December. For just over ten years, I've cultivated a plot at the Creigiau allotment site run by the Dynevor Gardening Association and it has not been without mental stress nor physical injury. When the weather conditions are such that it is impossible to plant out the seedlings which you have carefully nurtured and should have been put out a long time ago: when you finally get round to planting them and the following day you discover that they have been raised to the ground by slugs: or when, upon arriving at your plot, you find that it has been visited by a rogue rabbit or the strawberry-loving squirrel, there is a certain amount of stress to be felt. Straining muscles through "overdoing" the over-due winter digging can cause various degrees of discomfort.

But they say that a certain amount of stress is good for you and when, with the sun on your back and the birds singing, you eat the sweet peas from a freshly picked pod, it often feels that it is all worthwhile.

When I first took a plot with a friend in 1999, it seemed to me that I had become a member of kind of club for retired men, most of whom occupied "full sized" plots, measuring roughly



ninety feet by thirty. Over the years, the situation has gradually changed so that, now, most members occupy half-or even quarter-plots, reflecting the increase in busy lifestyles and the range of leisure activities available. It also is a result of the fact that we now have a lot more female members who have families to care for. So "Last of the Summer Wine" has transformed into "Loose Women".

As you would expect, the increase in the number of women members has, in turn, resulted in a an increased level of communication between members with the introduction of a news letter and a notice board It has also resulted in the setting up of a social committee to organize events. In April, a number of the most insane members made their way to the allotment site around four am to listen to the dawn chorus; the various songs were identified for us by a keen ornithologist member. We also had a trip to the National Botanical Gardens and a picnic tea to coincide with the judging of the pumpkin competition. In June, the site was open to the public as apart of the Open Gardens event. In view of the time of year, I should finally mention that, following last year's successful Christmas "Do" in the King's Arms, we will be playing skittles and celebrating Christmas in a pub in Tongwynlais.

So it's not all stress and injury! If you want to enjoy the benefits set out in the first paragraph of this article and make some new friends, get yourself an allotment. Unfortunately, it's not so easy in this area (as, I suspect is the case in many others). We have a waiting list which currently stands at over a dozen and there will therefore be a lengthy wait for anyone wanting to put his or her name forward for inclusion on that list. However, there are moves afoot to try to establish allotments in Pentyrch village. The Community Council has identified a suitable site that it owns but, unfortunately, Cardiff City Council claims that it does not have the funds to convert this site into viable allotments. There may be other sources of income but finance is the stumbling block at the moment. The Community Council is keen for this project to be brought to fruition so anyone who would like to assist in this endeavour should contact the Clerk to the Council, Alec Davies, whose telephone number is :- 20891417 and e-mail address is :-
