Cardiff Local Development Plan 2006-2026: Preferred Strategy Consultation 2012

On the 25th October at a meeting of Full Council the Cardiff Council approved its Local Development Plan: Preferred Strategy (hereinafter called the LDP for the sake of brevity) According to correspondence I have received from the LDP team, 'the Preferred Strategy shows how key current environmental, economic and social issues and trends affecting the city will be addressed

The plan identifies the areas of the county where development can take place between now and 2026.


- It looks to provide for a growth of some 45,400 dwellings over the plan period to 2026
- 18000 dwellings are planned for "Brown" field sites
- 18000 dwellings are planned for "Greenfield sites" which are cheaper to develop
- On the site described as land "South of Creigiau" 750 properties are planned
- On the site described as "Land North of Junction 33 of the M4" there are plans for 2000 residential properties. plus Business & Retail developments.
- On land between Rhydlafer,Radyr Pentrebane & St Fagans there are plans for 7500 properties
- In the technical papers the plan acknowledges these sites have
 - 1. The lack of community facilities
 - 2. Poor transport infrastructure
 - 3. Limited existing utility provision

A six week consultation period will now follow running from 1st November to 14th December 2012.

- A series of public events have been arranged by the County Council to give the public a chance to view and comment on the pre-deposit documents One of these is in Creigiau Church Hall on Thursday 29th November, 1pm - 6pm.


If you do nothing then these proposals will be accepted but if you act they may not.

At a public meeting in Creigiau on the 2nd November there was unanimous support to oppose the plan proposals. Residents are being asked to sign a petition, Posters have been put up and a petition is being circulated for all those who object to the proposals to sign

A website <u>www.savecreigiau.co.uk</u> has been set up and this has a lot more details of the plans, a survey and help on how to make you comments known

The threat to Creigiau and the local villages of Pentyrch and Groesfaen is that the plan identifies two sites which are described as individual sites even though they are only separated by the A4119 a point which seems to have been overlooked.

The aerial map shows Creigiau as it exists now with the

planned sites identified in different colours. The planners comments are that they view the 750 houses as a natural extension to Creigiau and the land North of the M4 junction 33 as "Unlikely to be any significant compatibility issues with surrounding land uses. If developed they will completely destroy Creigiau as we know it and make it into a town not a rural village.

The 2001 census showed 95 % of work trips are to destination outside the ward and of that 83% of work trips are by car.

The construction on all of these 10,250 properties in this locality will undoubtedly mean a long term difficulty on the roads even long after the construction traffic has ceased. Indeed the plans for Creigiau are a development in the furthest reaches of Cardiff on the boundary to Rhondda Cynon Taf and the Vale of Glamorgan. It will mean considerable extra travelling most of which will be by car with the negative environmental impact that will have.

Gestures

You may remember earlier this year that the media was intently focussed on the handshake that took place between the Queen and Martin Mcquinness the Stormont's Deputy first minister and former IRA commander. On the surface it was just two human beings respectfully greeting each other, but of course it was an enormously symbolic moment representing another milestone on the journey towards healing and greater reconciliation between two communities with a long and troubled history. Yes, it was only a handshake but still it was a genuinely important milestone in the story of our Nation as it seeks to grow beyond the troubles of the past and to a happier and more peaceful future.

Part 1 page 160 covers the Land North of Junction 33 (4 Pages) and Part 2 page 352 examines the proposals for the "Land south of Creigiau" (4 Pages). Objections and questions on these papers are likey to have a far greater effect than just an "I don't like it letter".

The public's views and comments will help in form the preparation of a more detailed plan called the **Deposit Plan** which is due to be considered by Cardiff County Council in Sept. 2013.

PACT meetings for Pentyrch and Gwaelod y Garth will, in future, be held at the Council offices in 1 Penuel Road, Pentyrch. This is because the Police expect halls for PACT meetings to be provided free of charge and the Rugby Club used to facilitate them, however they now have paying customers who are prepared to rent the room so the Police have had to look elsewhere. This Council have allowed them back, for free, into the building they vacated because they would not pay the rent on it anymore!

Re-surfacing Work

Most of you will have noticed lots of re-surfacing work being carried out to roads in the Council area, as announced by County Councillors Graham Thomas and Craig Williams and as reported in the Community Council minutes, (available to all discerning readers online www.pentyrch.cc) Robin Hill, Heol Pant y Gored, Station Road, Maes y Sarn, to mention but a few have all benefitted from the largesse of the Local Authority. Am I the only person who wishes a little more thought had been given to advising the residents of the work? The first I knew of all the works being carried out was when I was denied access to go along a road, although no explanation as to what was going on just a 'road closed' sign and a barrier. Come on Cardiff County communicate with your residents!

Community Council Highlights

Broadband Speeds

The Council were asked to approach Welsh Government in order to try and put pressure on BT/OpenReach to bring the rural areas, such as the outlying villages of Cardiff and the Vale, within the radar of the BT 'Infinity' programme. The request emanated from a Creigiau resident who as a radiologist was regularly being sent scans and x-rays via email to assess. Unfortunately his broadband speed was so slow that it was quicker to drive to the hospital, assess the scans/x-ray and drive home again than it would be to download some of the data he could have received. His download speed, in the middle of Creigiau, is 2.07 mb and upload 0.29mb. By contrast the Council office broadband speed is 6.1mb download and 0.4mb upload. whilst my home download speed, in the rural Vale, is 0.5mb download and 0.2 mb upload. Clearly this sort of disparity does little to encourage people to work from home or set up small businesses in rural areas. I have written to Mark Drakeford AM and received a swift and positive response from him, although I am still waiting for a response from Kevin Brennan MP. It is up to residents to register their interest in the new fibre optic broadband as BT will not install where there is no interest. All you need to do is go onto BT.com, click on 'Phone. Broadband & TV': click on 'Broadband' then click on the left hand side on 'Superfast BT Infinity'. You will then get an option saying 'Can I get BT Infinity' so enter your telephone number and click 'Check now'. If you live in this Council area you will get the following response. 'Sorry, you're not currently able to get BT Infinity. This may be because your area has not been enabled yet, or your individual line does support super-fast not broadband. Register your interest and we'll let you know if this changes.' It will then ask you to register your interest. Please do this as the more interest generated the more likely this area will be included a roll-out programme! Alternatively you can go directly to the right page at the web address www.productsandservices.bt.com/ consumerProducts/displayTopic.do? topicId=29017

Terrier Map

In an era of cutbacks it is even more important than ever to be able to give as early a warning as possible to all those organisations, big and small, which depend on Assembly decision-making, and the Finance Minister, Jane Hutt, has set a December deadline for bringing the process to a conclusion.

More locally, on 13th October I spent an enjoyable couple of hours in Gwaelod y Garth and Pentyrch carrying out street surgeries. As well as issues raised by individuals, there were lively discussions of parking and safety issues along Main Road at the school and village hall in Gwaelod. In Pentyrch, a public meeting about the future location of the Doctors' surgery was held on the same day, and it was good to be able to discuss the latest position on the spot. I've since taken up the issue with the chief executive of the Local Health Board.

On Monday 15th October I was able to attend one of the monthly meetings of the Community Council, with its usual lively discussion of a wide range of issues, from the very local to matters which affect the future of the whole of the City of Cardiff.

Frosty Bottom Farewell.

When we first opened up (in 2000) to raise money for the Taffs Well United Church, little did we know that a precedent was being set for a number of years to come – the name 'Frosty Bottom' had not then been given to our home, and we were simply 4 Nantygarth.

Initially we were very apprehensive about exposing our ideas and limited skills to the scrutiny of others who were far more professional and knowledgeable in the field of horticulture and garden design than we could ever hope to be, however, every gardener has something different to say, and every garden has something new to enjoy.

Our garden was never laid out to a master plan but, we were fortunate in that the previous owners had laid a nice lawn (with a concrete path down the middle), and had planted some small azaleas on the bank at the top of the lawn, and by 2000, it had a more settled appearance. Despite our apprehension the event was a success and the following year, we were asked if we would repeat the performance.

We had begun to visit other gardens on Open Days, and became increasingly aware of the limitations and the multiple gaps in ours. 'Opening-up' was a catalyst for the development of many of the features which we now enjoy and visiting other gardens is a wonderful way of developing ideas.

The event has become a part of the village calendar especially the teas and cakes provided by the ladies of the Gwaelod W.I. and the village Senior Citizens. Local business people, and other well- wishers, generously made donations, raffle prizes, etc, and visitors came from well outside the immediate vicinity. The popularity of the event increased, and in 2007, our takings exceeded £1000 for the first time, compared with the initial sum of just over £400 at our opening in 2000. Over the years we have made donations to ten different charities and good causes - all of this money has been donated by the kindness of our visitors, and to date is in excess of £12,000. Reluctantly, we have decided to call it a day. advancing years, and our ever-increasing expectations of what we want our garden to look like, do not make ready bedfellows. Before we depart we must say a massive thank you to everyone who has contributed to a memorable twelve years, particularly to our daughter Claire and her family, who have worked tirelessly behind the scenes. Many thanks to you all!



December Disaster Gwaelod y Garth. 1875

On December 6th, 1875, the Lan pit in Gwaelod y Garth was the scene of a massive explosion that killed 16 men and boys, injuring many more. One of the dead was a boy of just twelve years old. It was described as the most serious pit disaster of the year. The cause of the explosion was said to be defective ventilation. The Overman, Abraham Phillips, was declared negligent. The pit, which was opened in 1872 TW Booker, by employed 300 people- some

walking to work from Taffs Well, Tongwnlais, Pentrych and Radyr. The anguish and grief of the village has now faded from memory. There is no memorial to the men who died that day.

There is a chance for us to put right this omission. The entrance to the Lan drift mine is extant and in reasonable condition, as are the remains of the Guibal fan-house. If these were tidied-up we would have a site of historic interest within the village that would serve as a memorial to those who died. To this end, a group of residents has met to discuss this idea, put forward by Georgetown resident, Arthur Welsby. In July, local historian, Derek Thomas, Tom Procter and Alex Thorne met with CC Craig Williams in Wood Cottage, which was at the time of the disaster the house of Abraham Phillips. Reg Malpass, formerly a mining engineer, also attended. Since then, Dr

Return of the Village Seat



It was in 2006 that the Gwaelod v Garth bus stop seat was removed from its position adjacent to the brook at the top of Heol y Nant - a position it had occupied since 1959. Due to the continuous efforts of Mr Keith Roberts, the seat has now been restored to the community. Mr Roberts is in the process of transferring the ownership of both the seat and the land on which it is sited back to the Council. He had previously offered to donate the entire parcel of his land down to the stream to the Community Council, or to Cardiff County Council, for use by public, but the Adverse Possession claim precluded both Councils from accepting the land. Mr Roberts has now sold his parcel of land to the Claimant on the understanding that the seat be replaced. More than 100 residents had written to protest the loss of the seat. We are most grateful to see it back in place and thank Mr Keith Roberts for his considerable effort on behalf of residents.



NUMPTY idea not NIMBY attitudes

The proposal to build close to 3,000 homes on greenbelt surrounding the village of Creigiau has overwhelmingly rejected at a packed public meeting held at Creigiau Church Hall. Chaired by Councillor Wynford Elis Owen, residents who attended the meeting voted against building thousands of new houses around Creigiau, as proposed in Cardiff County Council's Local Development Plan.

The public meeting was addressed by the former Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Professor Delme Bowen, Councillor Stuart Thomas and by the leader of Plaid Cymru on Cardiff County Council, Councillor Neil McEvoy.

The meeting concluded that residents objected to the inclusion of Sites E (to the North of Junction 33 on the M4) and F (South of Creigiau) in Cardiff's Local Development Plan 2006 - 2026 as it stands on the arounds that:

- The projected population growth of 42% is unrealistic
- These particular sites are an inappropriate intrusion into a green belt - the size of which does not benefit from a sustainable infrastructure.
- and is not founded on robust and credible evidence.
