We have also been made aware that we are to lose one of the regular PCSOs supporting Community Policing in the village. Once we have the exact details, we will put a post on Facebook, but the really disappointing issue is that the PCSO is unlikely to be replaced, despite lobbying by the Watch.

Fly-tipping continues to be a recurring issue in many parts and approaches to the Village. If you witness anything, please contact the Community Council. The Watch is hoping to organise a Community Clean-up Event in the coming months. We also hope to have a General Village Meeting with a guest Speaker, probably in June. So do look out for a Newsletter, posters in the shops and on Village Notice Boards, and of course FACEBOOK!!

CC Community Council Highlights

CCC ~ LDP & the Precept

The Cardiff County Council Local Development Plan has moved on to the public hearings stage where a Welsh Government Inspector examines the LDP submitted by CCC for 'soundness'. The North West Cardiff Group, of which the Pentyrch Community Council is a member, was heavily involved in this process which tended to be dominated by the 'official side', namely, the CCC ~ LDP team, the developers, their advisors and agents. The presence of vocal local community groups is vital to keeping the process democratic and relevant, rather than the rubberstamping exercise that the 'official side' would have preferred. Transportation issues have and will continue to play a large part in the debate with the CCC transport plan being heavy on rhetoric and light on substance. The North West Cardiff Group; which also includes Radyr & Morganstown Community Council. St Fagans Community Council, The Llandaff Society, Cardiff Civic Society and the Danescourt Association; have proved to be a vocal and skilled pressure group. As I mentioned in the last Link the secretarial costs of this enterprise are being met by Radyr & Morganstown CC with financial contributions being made by all the funded members. This Council initially agreed to raise £10,000 towards the future funding of opposition to the LDP which, if left unchallenged, will change the whole of the area to the north-west of Cardiff forever and not for the better. However a review of future costings brought this figure down to £5,000 and this will be raised in a one off precept for this coming financial year. Consequently the precept for 2015/16 has been raised to £85,000 from £80,000 and will reduce back to the budgeted expenditure for 2016/17.

The cost for a Band D property will be an extra £1.52 which represents a 5.95% increase. All these issues and more are reported in the Council Minutes, which are on the Council web-site www.pentyrch.cc and hard copies are distributed throughout the Council area into public places.

Cardiff Council budget cuts

Cardiff County Council has made no secret of the fact that they have to make budget cuts and trim services to meet the savings required. I wonder at the wisdom at some of the 'savings' they are making. By way of an example a couple of years ago CCC (Parks department) installed an irrigation system for the hanging baskets they were supplying for the High Corner shops in Pentyrch. The cuts to the Parks Department must be really bad as they advised that they wouldn't replace the hanging Councillor baskets. Jeanette Troughton and colleagues from Pentyrch Open Gardens, especially Helen Edwards, came to the rescue and bought flowers for the Hanging Basket with Helen even buying a timer to replace the broken one on the irrigation system. Thus in 2014 the majesty of the hanging baskets at High Corner Shops was maintained. However, CCC were not done with the savings they needed to make and for 2015 they decided the cost of supplying water for the irrigation system was too expensive. They were however prepared to let some other Community Organisation take over this onerous cost. Cllr Troughton took this to a Council meeting in January and the PCC have agreed to fund the cost of the water to the irrigation system. The cost to Cardiff CC in 2014 for water was £35 for a standing charge and £1.41 for the water supplied. CCC are clearly aficionados of the old proverb 'Look after the pennies and the pounds will look after themselves'!

Community Council Library

The Community Council Library raised £48.80 in its first year of operation, which is a paltry sum bearing in mind the tremendous asset it could be to the Community and what is available, if only residents will use it. This money has been added to the budget for Grants awarded to the Community. So what goes around comes around.

We urge people to regularly use the service in order that any donations (suggested as 20p per book or 50p for three) can exceed 2014's total.

The Library is open Monday to Friday between 9am and 1pm. If

Grants

Since the last edition of the Community Link, grant applications from within the Community Council area were considered at the December 2014 meeting. £200 was awarded to the St Catwg's Church, Pentyrch and £80 to the Lan Memorial Project, Gwaelod y Garth. In addition, Council advertised for applications for the remaining tranche of the residual Rest Centre Monies, over Christmas and the New Year on the web-site and in the Noticeboards. Readers may remember, when this was originally done in 2012. Council set up an Applications Committee to examine the merits of the applications. In the event there were only three applicants this time round, namely, Pentyrch Rugby Club, who were seeking financial assistance to help stop their leaking Clubhouse Roof; Pentyrch Bowls Club, who are hoping to replace their existing clubhouse and Pentyrch Village Hall who intend replacing a failing flat roof with a pitched roof. Council decided to consider all the applications at the full Council meeting and noted that Pentyrch Rugby Club were the only one of the three applicants who had not applied in the first round of applications in 2012. It was decided that £4,000 would be awarded to the Rugby Club, £2,000 to the Bowls Club and £4,000 to the Pentyrch Village Hall. The grant applications for 2015/16 will be considered in the June, September, December and March meetings. County Council Notes

Cardiff Council Budget 2015–2016 Cardiff Council were required to cut £45million from their budget for 2015 / 2016. The budget proposals included funding cuts to many important front line service and provoked a lot of objection. We both objected strongly on many of the proposed cuts and co-ordinated an alternative budget with other opposition Councillors.

However, the budget was finally passed in February following amendments to save local services. It contained a number of key changes in respect of continuing to fund existing services until alternative arrangements can become operational.

Libraries - Continuing to fund branch libraries services until the end of the council term unless and until alternative delivery arrangements are operational.

Youth - Providing more time for the transition of the youth services, allowing the Council to keep current facilities running, together with supporting street-based and outreach working until new services are in place.

Day Services - Maintaining day services for older people until transitional arrangements and alternative services are developed and put in place.

Individual Electoral Registration The way we all register to vote changed in June 2014. The new system is called 'Individual Electoral Registration' (IER) and is the biggest change to the voter registration system in 100 years. Now, each individual will be responsible for registering themselves.

Most people who are already registered will be transferred automatically to the new register. However some people will need to re-register in the City of Cardiff Council. There are also people in the area who are not registered to vote at all and so need to register to have their say in elections.

If you weren't registered previously, you can register under the new system at <u>www.gov.uk/register-to-</u> <u>vote</u>. If you don't receive a letter contact Cardiff Electoral Services on 029 2087 2087 (Option 5).

Following adjournments several break and away meetings, the budget was finally agreed and reflected many of the proposals from our alternative budaets. although not all. For example we wanted to cap the 5% Council Tax increase to a lower level

Cardiff LDP – A Big Thank YOU To The North West Group By Cllr Graham Thomas

You will know from my previous updates that Cardiff approved their Local Development Plan (LDP) in 2014 which allows for up to 11,000 houses in North West Cardiff. This has now gone to an Independent Examiner who will make a final binding report in August 2015.

These proposals will have a huge impact on many communities in North West Cardiff, and have led to a collaborative group called the North West Cardiff Group to be formed. I am proud to be a member of this group on behalf of Save Creigiau and the Pentyrch Community Council which meets regularly and offers a sanity check to the LDP proposals. Pentyrch Community Council, together with other Communities in St Fagans, Creigiau, Radyr, Llandaff, and Danescourt will all be affected in different ways by the lack of transport provision, loss of green spaces and effects on local communities.

I found the meetings to be detailed and involved with comprehensive contributions on many aspects of the LDP including transport and local sites. As members of the North West Group we made the Examiner fully aware of the problems the LDP will cause our local communities and argued for changes to the LDP that will protect us from uncontrolled urban sprawl. And thanks to members of the Save Creigiau Team for ensuring that we were represented at every important session together with the NW Group and others.

Details of these meetings are available on the Council Website www.cardiff.gov.uk/LDP under 'Examination' but to pick out some key actions points that Cardiff Council will now have to address see below :-

HS 14 (Action Point4)

Council to consider a separate policy for metro/rapid transit, and identify routes (where known) and route options to be safeguarded on

Council to provide information in respect of on-going discussions with RCT and other bodies in relation to transport infrastructure requirements associated with the allocations in North West Cardiff.

HS 8 (Action Point)

Council to consider the need for the Rapid Transit corridor to be embedded and safeguarded within the schematic framework and Plan.

We are now in the final leg of the LDP decision which has been a long and difficult journey but it's important to thank and acknowledge those that have not let the fight slip for one moment. By the end of 2015 we will finally know what the impacts we be for all us.

Community Naticeboard

The Parish Church of St Catwg, Pentyrch

St Catwg's Church nestles in the valley that houses "Old" Pentyrch on the road from Pentyrch to Rhydlafar. Within the Parish, which extends from Groesfaen to just above Gwaelod y Garth, there must be many people who do not know of the church's existence, probably because the through road in the village bypasses old Pentyrch.

The Parish of Pentyrch is one of the oldest in the Diocese of Llandaff dating back to the Norman period when dioceses were established. At that time, St Catwg's allegiance to the monasteries at Llancarfan and Llanilltyd Fawr lessened as those monasteries declined and the influence of the monastery at Llandaff grew. The earliest authentic records of Pentyrch church are to be found in

two Papal Bulls of 1128 and 1129. In these, Pope Honorious 2nd. confirmed to Urban, Bishop of Llandaff, who built the first Norman Cathedral, the Church of Llandaff and its possessions, the list of which includes "Ecclesia Pentirch". It is probable that this list is a copy of an even earlier record. There are many recorded references to the parish in the 12th, 13th, 16th and 17th centuries.

However, the history of Christianity within Pentvrch dates to the time of Catwg often called Cadoc or Cadog in the early years of the 6th century, when Catwg, then Abbot of the monastery at Llancarfan, or one of his followers, set up a cell in Pentvrch. In the Celtic Church, the name given to the church, normally built of wood or daub and wattle. was that of the monk who settled there. The fact that the spring just below the church is named "Ffynnon *Catwg*" and that this runs into a little "Nant stream called Gwladys"(Gwladys was the name of Catwg's mother) strongly suggests that it was Catwo himself who sojourned there. Holy wells figure frequently in the lives of Welsh Saints and it is, perhaps, significant that the well adjacent to the church environs is named after Catwo.

We do not have an image of the Church previous to our present church, and considerable research has failed to find one. (If anyone has a sketch or painting of the church prior to 1857, please let the Vicar have sight of it). However, we have been able to glean some information from a study of old church documents and newspapers.

"The Ordinary Visitation" by the Bishop (Edward) or his representative in 1845, showed the Church Wardens to be quite optimistic over the state of the church, although after the clerk had been paid (£2.10d), there was no money left to carry out repairs. But the body, roof, steeple and

buttresses were in a good state of repair, as were the pews. There was a "Reading Pew" for the minister, a "comely and decent" pulpit, a large Bible and a Book of Common prayer for his use, but not one for the clerk. Bells were rung for the services, the church was cleaned regularly, but there were no feasts, juries, temporal courts, leets or musters in the church, or church vard, Action was taken to keep "idle persons from abiding in the church porch and church yard," and action was taken to prevent tippling in the public houses on the Lord's day, "especially during the hours of divine service".

But from the early years of the nineteenth century, the upkeep of the church was proving increasingly expensive, until: "The church at Pentyrch is in an extremely dilapidated state, and must be rebuilt upon an enlarged scale, as the population of the parish has greatly increased of late years." (The Morning Chronicle Wednesday 18 May 1853)

We have very few artefacts from the previous building. There is a mediaeval font and a stoup of a similar age. (The font was found being used as a planter in a neighbour's garden and the stoup in a neighbour's wall.) Within the bell turret are two ancient bells, one of which is pre-Reformation, and engraved with the name: "Sancta Catrina" and the other is engraved: "Willia(m) Howard 1700". On the grass bank to the right as you walk through the Lych gate is a Monolithic Socketed Base-block for a Cross, which dates to the 13th or 14th century. Presumably, for many years, the cross would have been a major feature in front of the church. Attached to the wall at the west end of the church, is a stone slab, with an incised floriated cross and Latin inscription, which was discovered by workmen in 1882, embedded in the



earth beneath the chancel pavement. Dr Nash Williams described it as a 15th century slab, similar to some seen at Tintern Abbey. It is supposedly to commemorate Matthew Drew of Castell y Mynach a member of an ancient Glamorgan family, who, so the story relates, was foully done to death by his blacksmith, who, owing him a grudge, placed a poisoned awl in the seat of his chair.

The present Church of St Catwg

The present church was consecrated on Thursday 26th November 1857, supplanting a "plain old ediface, which had for some years fallen into a state of dilapidation" (Cardiff and Merthyr Guardian 28th November 1857). One of the main benefactors was Mr Booker Blakemore M.P. (there is a plaque commemorating his life on the wall at the entrance to the chancel) who gave £200 towards the cost. Many people, however, including many villagers contributed to the £1770-4-0d cost of the new church.

St Catwg's Church is a grade 2 listed church as a fine example of a Victorian Village Church. The architect was John Pritchard from the Diocesan architects Messrs Pritchard and Siddon. Soon after the completion of St Catwg's Church, they worked together on Llandaff Cathedral and similarities can be seen in their work in both churches. They also worked together on a number of churches in South Wales and in the London area.

A contemporary view of the architecture of St Catwg's.

"At St Catwg's John Pritchard seems to have embraced the Decorated period rather more enthusiastically than usual, particularly in the light west window with its rich, flowing tracery, where he placed his personal stamp on the ornamentation. Pritchard's design of the windows of the church demonstrate his desire to deviate from the strict Geometrical style. It was in this spirit of restrained freedom that the design of the south-west corner of the church was conceived. The turret with its spire rising to a height of 80 feet from the ground is the outstanding feature of the church and contributed to Pritchard's growing reputation as the leading architect in South Wales."

(Church Buildings in Victorian Glamorgan. Geoffrey R Orrin)

So, if you visit the church what else will you see? (The church is open most days during the hours of daylight and you are very welcome to visit and spend time in the church or in the churchyard.) You will enter a place of peace and tranquillity and see the beautiful stained glass east window dedicated to the Morgan family; the fine oak altar given by Thomas Llewellyn in memory of his wife, Joan; the carved pulpit; the fine very large west window described above by Geoffrey Orrin; the mediaeval font and stoup; the wedding canon from Pentyrch Iron works; and much more. I must not forget the yew tree, that my measurements indicate could be close to 1,000 years old. (More of that in the booklet indicated below)

The Parish is currently reordering the church to meet the demands of present day worship and use, just as would have happened over the many centuries of the church in Pentyrch. This will entail removing the mediaeval font from the steeple housing to the front of the church to be used for Baptism, and moving the Victorian Font to the wall on the east side of the door; replacing the inner wooden door with a glass door using the iron hinges from the wooden door; replacing most of the Victorian pews with faith chairs (these hook together to form a row rather like a pew); and building a wooden cupboard in the north west corner of the church to house a small kitchen. The





church will be redecorated and the lighting improved. These changes will enable us to extend fellowship in the form of a social gathering after services; to hold meetings and study groups in the Nave of the church which is difficult now with the heavy pews; to use the church as an educational resource for visiting groups and for school children. Replacing the pews with chairs will make the church safer, and will address the problem that a number of the pews are not stable and unsafe: we are also attempting to address the issue of accessibility for those with limited mobility.

I should add, that I cannot do justice to the history of the church in this short article. If you want to pursue that further, copies of the History of St Catwg's Church, Pentyrch, are available in the church at £2. The booklet contains a bibliography of my research from which the above article is taken. John Gough

INDUSTRIAL HISTORY WALK.

Cardiff County Council has been deeply involved in the Lan Memorial Project. They asked us to create an Industrial History Walk to show how much the area was affected by Victorian Industry in the late 19th. century and how it has changed.

It is hard to look out over the Taff Valley now and imagine just what Gwaelod y Garth looked like in the days of the Lan Colliery and Booker's Iron Works. What is now the village sports field was a holding pool for the iron smelters. Young children scraped out the ash while chimneys around them belched toxic fumes. Eleven year olds worked underground at the Lan. The area was deep in coal dust, iron oxide, mud and poverty. Welsh, the natural language of the village, was being infiltrated with the Master's English.

Do you know where the furnaces were? The slag heaps? Have you seen the entrance to the Lan Colliery? Did you know that Thomas Booker founded a school in what is now Bethlehem Cottages? Do you know where Pentyrch bricks were made? Have you seen Tym Crydd's iron disc on the Garth - that circle around which ponies walked to operate the mechanism to bring up the coal from the Gwcw (cuckoo)? Have you seen the witches stone?

It was all here for the Masters - coal, iron, stone, trees for charcoal ... and families desperate to earn the meagre wage to keep their families. This area is a focal point of Victorian Industry. Patellofemoral pain syndrome (PFPS)

The knee is made of 2 joints - a hinged knee joint comprising of the long thigh bone (femur) which sits on top of the shin bone (tibia) and the **patellofemoral joint** – a triangular kneecap (patella) which slides in the groove at the end of the femur and enveloped by the quadriceps tendon.

Pain is vague, felt in the front of the knee and 25% of the population will endure it. Its common! and very treatable with physiotherapy.

Pain is often felt:-

On stairs / getting up and down from sitting Sitting for prolonged periods with your knee bent

Why's there pain?

People with PFPS have poor gluteal (buttock muscle) function on climbing stairs. The hip is then less stable and the femur swings inwards stressing the knee. The outer half of the patellofemoral joint surface becomes overloaded producing pain.

In sitting the quadriceps are taut invoking a compression force at the patellofemoral joint- over time produces pain. **Possible contributing factors?**

Old running shoes with little support.

Tight muscles

Weak muscles creating imbalances

Training programme suddenly intensified

Swelling inhibits the quadriceps causing the patella to maltrack and induce pain.

Quick wins

Avoid pain provoking exercise.

Ice can assist swelling - wrapped in a protective covering over the front of the knee - 10 minutes 4 times a day.

Avoid sitting with the knee bent for prolonged periods.

Via your GP /pharmacist non-steroidal antiinflammatories may offer benefits.

Review aging foot wear/insoles.

Thank you to everyone who donated cakes, volunteered to work in the café, donated prizes for the raffle, the crafters and the hundreds of people who came and supported the event.


PENTYRCH TENNIS CLUB



Creigiau Allotments – Forest Garden

If you walk from the old railway line to the recreation field by the tennis courts, you may have noticed a lot of clearing work being undertaken at the bottom of the allotment site. The area was originally cultivated as allotment plots, but became too overgrown for cultivation and was left to 'go wild'.

The allotment group decided that the area was a prime location for a forest garden – a low maintenance area incorporating native fruit trees and shrubs, such as blackthorn, crab apple and dog-rose, as well as encouraging wild flowers and become a haven for wildlife. During February and March the area has been cleared of rubbish and the brambles cut back; hazel trees have been coppiced to promote growth (and ultimately bean sticks!) and the pathway defined with hedging planted alongside.


There is still plenty of work to do – planting, making wildlife friendly environments such as log piles, and bird nesting boxes. The area is not enclosed and it is hoped that anyone walking through will take a look at what is going on, and enjoy the facility as it develops.
