

ST ELLDEYRN CAPEL LLANILLTERNE

Recently the name of the Parish has changed to the Parish of Pentyrch with Capel Llanillterne. For over forty years Capel Llanillterne has been with the Parish of Llandaff with the Dean as Vicar and assistance given by the Cathedral clergy.

The Parish will remain separate from Pentyrch with its own churchwardens and P.C.C. and will run its own affairs with the Vicar of Pentyrch as their Priest in Charge.

The Church of St Elldeyrn is a delightful little church on the main road from Llandaff to Llantrisant. It was originally built as a Chapel of ease to St Fagans, rebuilt on an earlier site by the Windsor Family in 1862 to designs by the renowned and distinguished Victorian Architect in Britain G.E. Street.

The Interior has some interesting features such as the hatchments, early Christian stones and a medieval font.

Recently the Llantrisant and District Local History Society held their meeting at the Church, with a talk given by J Barry Davies and Anthony L Jones, more information can be obtained from the paper they presented.

Capel Llanillterne has a small loyal congregation and we welcome them into the Parish and hope in time we get to know each other in worship and fellowship.

The service on Sunday morning is at 10.30 a.m. and everyone is Welcome.

URDD NATIONAL EISTEDDFOD

CARDIFF & THE VALE 2001

Appeal Committee for Creigiau, Pentyrch and Gwaelod-y-Garth

The Urdd National Eisteddfod will be held at the end of May 2001 in Cardiff. It is a six-day Cultural Festival for Welsh Youth recognised as the biggest of its kind in Europe. There are 14,000 participants who will include many local children. More than 100,000 visitors attend and there are many activities for the general public to enjoy at the Festival Site with Bilingual information available.

The Event costs over a million pounds to stage. The Creigiau, Pentyrch and Gwaelod-y-Garth area has been set a challenging target of £15,000 to raise. After two public meetings a committee has been elected with John Williams of Perthi Bach, Pentyrch (20890101) as its Chairman. As a base for the fund raising, John has already instigated a Covenant Club. Since the last Budget it is easy to set single donations against tax as well as regular payments and forms to this end are available from the Treasurer, Carwen Jones (20892853). Over £1200 has already been received in the first two weeks.

A Jumble Sale is being organised by Ann Hughes (20892038) on Saturday morning, the 27th May, at Pentyrch Village Hall and a Fun Sports Evening for youngsters under the control of Mr. Peter Evans, Head of Creigiau School, is proposed for the 7th July at Pentyrch RFC.

Many other events are being planned, not only with money in mind, but also to raise awareness of the Urdd and its work and to generate social activity and harmony in the community.

Henstaff Court - A Brief History

The house known today as Henstaff Court is a relatively modem dwelling built around the turn of the 20th Century with links back as far as 1066. It represents an ancient farmstead and was the seat of the gentry in the 16th Century

The lands were owned by many famed people through the centuries including the Herbert family, the Gabalfa family and Marquis of Bute.

Although known for its absentee

The Morel family, made wealthy by their shipping enterprises occupied the property for much of this century

In 1970 the estate was purchased as a family home and working farm by Mr Larry Ryan until sold in 1986 to a civil engineering company Davy Group (Monks) - later to be taken over by Trafalgar House and Kvaerner.

In 1995 the property was bought by Larry Ryan's son - Laurence Ryan and remained leased to Kvaerner until June 1997 when he ventured to let the complex out again as a corporate headquarters. However, due to the ever-increasing competition for that need coming from the City Centre and Cardiff Bay he turned his attention to developing a Business Centre for smaller company needs.

We All Pay For It

Recently Creigiau and Pentyrch have been suffering a spate of

Residents have had fence panels kicked in and totally destroyed. Further instances include events at the Recreation field in Creigiau where hundreds of pounds worth of damage have been done to the gate, building and even the cricket surface.

Although residents have to pay for the damage to their property we all

When damage is done to a facility such as the Recreation field it is a direct cost on the Community Charge we pay. That is bad enough but what is not measurable is the frustration felt by those individuals who have over a number of years worked so hard to establish valuable sporting facilities with our villages only to see this work wrecked for minutes of senseless enjoyment for a small mindless minority.

The important point of all of this is that this damage is not being done by some alien source but by some of our own children!

That is not to say that all the youth of the villages are involved. Many of the youth who congregate in groups around the village are simply looking for somewhere to "chill out", play their music, (usually loud), away from "the olds" oversight. Some of these take a responsible attitude to what is happening around the villages and are perturbed that they are being coated with the same brush as those whose antisocial behaviour is the cause of so much of the trouble. If your son or daughter has any knowledge of the troublemakers please make that information known to the police or to Neighbourhood Watch.

LOCAL POLICE NOTES

At the present time we are not suffering with many house burglaries but there have certainly been a number of garages and sheds attacked in all the three villages. These incidents have involved the thefts of cycles, mowers and tools. All too often we are finding instances of cycles stolen from the garden or unlocked sheds.

We suggest you consider improving the security of your outhouses. It might be advisable to shackle lock valuable items to a suitable wall where possible. Security lighting is also a useful deterrent.

Motor Crime

There have been problems of thefts from cars. In February in particular alloy wheels were being stolen from parked up cars. Again there have been cases of lap-top computers and bags, etc being left on the back seats of cars, so don't make it too easy for our thieving friends.

Parking

A regular complaint at the moment is the parking outside of Creigiau and Pentyrch junior schools, particularly when children are being picked up in the evening. If you are a parent and you have to use your car can you please consider parking further away from the school. At the moment double-parking and parking on pavements is compromising the safety of other road users, particularly the children.

Scramblers

The police have recently been receiving complaints about scramble motorcycle annoyance, particularly over weekends. Motorcycles are being ridden on land without permission, causing damage to environmentally sensitive areas as well as local playing fields, etc and also annoyance and danger to members of the public. Very often youths below the legal age are riding these machines on roads, obviously without documents.

If your child is using one of these machines it is your responsibility to ensure he or she has the permission of the landowner and that arrangements are made to convey the motorcycle by trailer. You also should consider the fact that the child should be strictly supervised for its own safety. I do not know of any land in the immediate area where this practice is allowed. Because of the volume of complaints Offenders will be prosecuted.

Neighbourhood Watch

Creigiau Neighbourhood Watch has scored some notable successes recently with local information leading to he arrest of a person for a serious offence and assistance in targeting active car thieves. All watches are keen to enrol new members and I urge you to support your local watch if you are not already doing so.

Creigiau 2000 Committee has decided to commemorate the millennium with a facelift to the arboreal look of the village. First on the agenda is a plan to landscape the area in the centre of the village around the play park opposite the Creigiau Inn. This will take the form of planting suitable natural vegetation and plants, of a seasonal nature, held in by extending the existing retaining wall.

The second area under consideration is the entrance to the recreational field. Here, the plan is to lay down a layer of topsoil, (which we hope will be donated), and plant shrubs and rhododendrons. A Costly Problem

The expense of clearing fly tipping is a considerable cost that we all have to pay for in our community charge. Residents can help: -

- 1 Report any vehicles that you see or even suspect may be involved in fly tipping.
- 2 If you are having any work done (particularly by door to door tradesmen) ask where they are going to dispose of rubbish. Ask to see the dockets for any previous loads they have disposed of.

COMMUNITY HEALTH COUNCILS- what they are and what they do-

Community Health Councils (CHCs) were established by Parliament in 1974 as independent bodies "to represent the interests of the public in the health service in their district" - i.e. to give local people an independent voice in their local NHS and the services it provides.

They are popularly known as the "local health watchdog". CHCs are statutory bodies created under primary legislation and governed by Statutory Instruments, but they are completely independent within the NHS.

CHCs have no executive powers but have developed to fulfil three main functions:

representing public views, monitoring and scrutinising the NHS and providing complaints advice to individuals:

- they raise public awareness of NHS issues and represent the views of the public within the NHS, ensuring that local health care needs are recognised
- they monitor and evaluate from a patient's viewpoint the effectiveness of NHS services provided and can hold NHS bodies to account
- they provide independent help and advice to individuals and to complainants who have problems with NHS services.

There are 22 CHCs in Wales, only half of which are exactly coterminus with Unitary Authority boundaries. All CHCs have one Chief Officer and an Assistant but the staff of nearly half the CHCs are only funded to work part time. CHC staff are formally appointed and funded by the Secretary of State for Wales.

Most CHCs in Wales have 20 members. The NHS Act governs the composition of the membership: one half (10 members) are appointed by Unitary Authorities. at least one third (8 members) are appointed by Voluntary organisations, by means of a postal ballot organised by the Welsh Office. the remaining members (2) are nominated by the Secretary of

State

CHCs are able to co-opt additional members.

Members are initially appointed for a period of four years and half the membership changes on a two yearly cycle. They can be reappointed for a second term of four years. All members serve in a voluntary capacity and are unpaid, apart from expenses.

CHCs are funded directly by the Welsh Office. The largest part of CHC funding is absorbed by salary and premises costs only a small amount of funding is available for activities, projects, research or publications. CHCs are inadequately funded to carry out the broad range of functions that the public expects of them.

CHCs RIGHTS AND DUTIES. CHCs have a statutory right:

- to receive information from Health Authorities
- to be consulted on proposals for any substantial change in use or development of health services in their district
- to enter and inspect certain health services premises in their home district (but not premises owned by General Practitioners or Dentists)
- to send observers to board meetings of the Health Authority and more recently to NHS Trusts
- to meet formally at least annually with the Health Authority in their area.

CHCs also have a statutory duty:

- to meet in public at least once every three month's
- to publish an annual report to the Health Authority on the performance of their functions

In practice CHCs have developed good working relationships with Health Authorities, Trusts, Local Authorities, voluntary organisations and primary care services. They are normally invited to attend and contribute to a wide range of meetings. Likewise, CHCs invite representatives of Trusts, Health Authorities, Local Health Groups and Local Authorities to attend and address their meetings on a regular

basis

On a day to day basis CHCs: -

- act as a voice for their community on the standards and appropriateness of local health services, having consulted local people and gathered users views
- try to ensure that local views and needs influence the policies and plans of Health Authorities and Trusts
- respond to consultation documents from the Welsh Office and Health Authorities
- monitor the quality of local services from the patients' point of view the "watchdog" function to bring about improvements and changes. This will involve visiting hospitals and health care premises and reporting their findings back to the CHC, Trusts and Health Authorities
- act as "honest brokers" between different health care agencies, including local authorities and voluntary bodies, providing an overview perspective to all service providers
- work with other agencies to improve services for their populations
- provide information and advice to the public on local health services and help the public to understand how the service works so that they become more informed and responsible users
- help individual patients with problems and complaints about the health service and advise or support them at hearings.

As a result of working with complainants CHCs are in a strong position to press for changes and improvements in services.

WHY DIET CAN MAKE YOUR PET FEEL LIKE A DOG

Scientific surveys show that up to one in three dogs may be allergic to wheat, beef and dairy products. Commonly used in pet foods symptoms can vary widely from loss of' condition through to severe skin complaints, weight loss and diarrhoea. Labels often contain confusing and obscure terms such as "meat and animal derivatives" and "vegetable protein extracts". The former incidentally means that any part of a carcass including skin" bone and offal can be included and not necessarily from the same species as that emblazoned on the label.

How many people are aware that on average 80%, of canned dog and cat foods is water though often described as "moisture on the label.

Furthermore some of what goes into apart from water is for cosmetic appearance. It is added for the "benefit" of the owner not the dog. Owners should carefully read the "ingredients" and "analysis" sections of labels though these are usually in tiny print in obscure places they are legally required on every tin or pack and worth searching out.

They will often tell you how misleading the brightly coloured front of the pack really is. There is evidence to suggest that food allergies are increasing among dogs and it is estimated that up to 30% of dogs suffer to a greater or lesser degree from a food related allergy. Experts are now calling for clearer labelling rules so that owners can really tell what they're feeding their pets and avoid possibly harmful constituents.
