Ymlaen Pentyrch Onward Mosaic



The Millenium Mosaic prepared by Ymlaen Pentyrch Onward was unveiled on 25 June. Following a dedication by the Vicar, Rev Holcombe, and a speech by the Deputy Lord Mayor Christine Priday.

Ymlaen Pentyrch Onward was formed to bring together various organisations in Pentyrch and to consider events to mark the Millennium.

Following extensive consultation it was decided to commission the design and installation of a mosaic on the bank adjoining Clawddshon Cottage.

The mosaic incorporates the logos of various organisations in the Village as well as buildings of community interest.

Because the group wanted to indicate the importance of everyone we decided to incorporate the faces of two individuals from different ends of the spectrum. At the one end we have Mrs Winnie Davies - who unveiled the mosaic - and young Adam Christopher who had just been born when the design was being considered.

This project has involved people from all sections of the community. Andrew Bolton (the artist we commissioned) involved children from the schools, young people from the Youth Club and others in its design and construction. The concrete base for the mosaic was provided by the Board Brothers.

Much hard work has been undertaken locally because funds were needed to provide for future maintenance as well as initial costs. But the grant from the Landfill Tax

COMMUNITY COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Fairmeadow Fields

Since 1996 Fairmeadow Fields and Cefn Bychan woodland have been kept as a conservation area. Unfortunately due to the vandalism and destruction by local children and scrambler /mountain bikes this has been a difficult task. The Community Council decided to undertake a study to find out what future use the residents around the fields and woodland wanted. Approximately 120 questionnaires where distributed to the surrounding area. 11% replied. The results are as follows:-

The major concern for residents is the nuisance and destruction caused by youths on scrambler bikes. The majority of residents who replied want the fields and woodlands kept as a conservation area. The Community Council will now consider all the replies and take appropriate action.

YOUR SAY

Cardiff County Council are in the process of devising a Unitary Development Plan (UDP). The UDP will be the blueprint of the proposed future of Cardiff up to 2016 and will be available soon for public consultation.

The Community Council would like to ensure that the villages are not overlooked and the aspirations of local residents are reflected in the UDP. To this end the Community Council are drawing up their own Community Plan. Councillors have already outlined a number of issues they would like to pursue but need to be sure that these are in line with residents wishes.

Current proposals are divided into two categories - Projects and Campaign issues. These categories have then been sub divided into short term/current - those that are easily attainable and relatively inexpensive, and long term/new - those that require co- operation from other partnerships or are in need of additional funding.

Projects

Short Term

- Conservation -To safeguard the conservation of the area's wild flowers, plants and animals, particularly in areas such as Fairmeadow fields and woodland, Pentyrch, the Frog Pond, Creigiau, and Gwaelod y Garth woodland. To provide nesting boxes in the appropriate locations and to preserve the areas around the quarries;
- <u>Villages</u> To enhance the villages by way of providing shrubs and flowers. Promoting a sense of pride in the villages with the ultimate aim of entering the "Best Kept Village" competition. To improve landscaping around the fingerpost, Gwaelod y Garth.
- Residents To support improved provisions for the elderly. To support improved provisions for the youth. To

- support local organisations.
- <u>Recreation</u> To support the provision of sports facilities in Pentyrch, Creigiau and Gwaelod y Garth;
- To provide and promote booklets/leaflets of the public rights of ways within the area and possibly the formation of a Pentyrch Ramblers association.

Long Term

- Recreation To provide additional recreational facilities for Creigiau by way of a Community Hall/Centre. To work in conjunction with the Trustees of Pentyrch Scout Hut to provide better facilities.
- Access To provide pedestrian access from Creigiau village to the Recreation ground. To improve pedestrian access from Pentyrch to Gwaelod y Garth along the old green lane.
- <u>Facilities</u> To formulate a comprehensive "History of the Community". To provide a reference library of village matters and/or a small library and reading room. To improve facilities at Capel Llanilltern. To improve School Lane, Gwaelod y Garth

Campaign Issues Ongoing

- To conserve the villages against over development and to ensure they maintain their rural character;
- To campaign against the extension of the local quarries;
- To campaign for lighting on Ty Nant Road, Creigiau;
- To promote the education of the Welsh language;
- To ensure that a Police presence is maintained in the villages.
- To campaign for a more equal electoral representation in Creigiau.

Nev

- To oppose any junction from the A4119 to the M4;
- To campaign for a weight limit

- through Creigiau and to ensure that existing weight limits are enforced:
- To have a Rural Transport Policy which will include the campaign for the improvement of the county lane network, the campaign for a new light diesel railway line through Creigiau, the campaign for a cycle network to link with the Taff Trail;
- To take on further Agency agreements with the County;
- To campaign for recycling facilities in the villages.

RMC's construction of the new roundabout on the Ynys Bridge Road had revealed Old Lime Kilns in disrepair. These have now been renovated by RMC and the area has been landscaped to make them a feature and local attraction.

The lime would have been used by the Pentyrch ironworks and the Melingriffith tin plate works in Whitchurch.

Review of Nycomed Amersham's Radioactive Discharges

At a meeting in Whitchurch High School on February 2nd the Environment Agency opened the Consultation procedure to consider the application by Nycomed Amersham in Forest farm, Coryton to vary their radioactive discharge authorisations. In a packed hall, the Company spoke at length, stressing that the radioactivity they discharge into our air and water is completely safe. They monitor radioactivity in our food regularly, assuming - to the horror of allotment holders present. that we buy most of it in the supermarket. The Environment Agency admitted that the sewers carrying the radioactive waste to sea overflows 60 times a year into Whitchurch brook. A mother from the audience stressed that children paddle in the brook. Someone else commented that the overflow goes into the houses.

Radioactive tritium and other radionuclides are in Cardiff's air and water and as Dr Guilford has agreed inside everyone living here. Vegetables are found with 50 - 100 units compared with 'natural' levels of 3 - 5 units (Bq/Kg). Grass showed 1100 units; a sample of blackberries 9000 units. Fish caught locally have up to 50, 000 units, sediments in the Taff 5,000 units and eels up to Blackweir 17,000 units. A shelduck

monitored showed 60875 total tritium Bq/Kg (government monitoring figures). Nycomed Amersham plc Cardiff are the second highest discharger of tritium in the UK and the only nuclear licensed site situated in a major city with a large population.

Nycomed Amersham discharges under licence and people are assured that the radioactivity in our environment is safe. But low level radiation over time is thought by some scientists to be hazardous to the health of the young and the vulnerable. Effect on the DNA have been demonstrated by the Medical Research Council at Harwell.

Community Concern has three aims: a limit to the nuclear store on the flood plains of the Taff, independent research into the health effects of low level radiation; and a reduction of radioactive discharge into the environment. Actual reductions are required, not just a 'juggle' with the authorised limits - which does not affect actual discharge. There is NO reduction in actual discharges in the current Application. The Environmental Agency consultation period will continue until the end of the year.





FUTURE DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR PENTYRCH AND CREIGIAU

Cardiff County Council is required by law to prepare a "Unitary Development Plan" (UDP) to show how Cardiff's future requirements for new homes, jobs, community and transport facilities will be met while, at the same time attempting to protect the environment.

Cardiff County Council has now issued an outline plan for public consultation. Early proposals from potential developers had suggested that the Creigiau area might be a target for over 1000 new dwellings. These suggestions were strongly opposed by local council members and organisations. The plan now released indicates that the new housing developments will be concentrated in the North East Lisvane and around the Pontprennau. Some 1000 new houses are suggested for the Pentrebane Farm Estate just north of St Fagans, but no specific housing proposals are outlined for Pentyrch or Creigiau over the next fifteen years. This does not of course preclude developers from submitting planning applications for such developments.

The most noteworthy proposal in the plan, which extends over fifteen years to 2016, is the establishment of a light diesel railway to run from Cardiff to Creigiau. The new rail line would extend westwards from the City Circle line at Fairwater with new rail stations being established at Canton, St Fagans and Capel Llanilltern. Park-and-Ride facilities are envisaged at Capel Llanilltern, the latter presumably being sited near the M4 junction. The line would largely utilise old trackways already in existence leading to Creigiau.

Major areas of the countryside to be protected include land at St Fagans-Ely Valley, The Garth Hill

THE LEGACY OF JOHN THOMAS

Many of the residents of Gwaelod y Garth will remember the craftsmanship and colourful personality of John Thomas, the harp-maker who lived at Pear Tree Cottage from the mid 50s until 1976 when he moved to Pembrokeshire. John died in 1992 but his skill and artistry lives on in the work of his former apprentices Brian Blackmoor and Alun Thomas who have supplied hundreds of harps for professional and amateur harpists far and wide. They have specialised in making triple harps with a new design pioneered by John and were recently commissioned to make a triple harp for the Welsh College of Music and Drama. This harp is now in constant use by the many talented young harpists at our National Conservatoire.
